Desktop Publishing

We hear and see the term 'Desktop publishing' a lot these days. What exactly is it? What does it mean? Desktop publishing (abbreviated DTP) is the creation of page layouts for documents using DTP software.

Today, there are several Desktop Publishing (DTP) software available in the market. Some of the popular DTP software are Adobe PageMaker, Adobe InDesign, QuarkXPress, etc.

1.2 Introduction to Adobe **PageMaker**

Adobe PageMaker is a page layout software. It is used to design and produce documents that can be printed. You can create anything from a simple business card to a large book.

Page layout software includes tools that allow you to easily position text and graphics on document pages. For example, using PageMaker, you could create a newsletter that includes articles and pictures on each page. You can place

pictures and text next to each other, on top of each other, or beside each other—wherever you want them to go.

1.3 Opening PageMaker

In the Windows 7 operating system, we can open Adobe PageMaker using the command sequence $Start \rightarrow All \ Programs \rightarrow Adobe \rightarrow Pagemaker 7.0 \rightarrow Adobe \ PageMaker 7.0$.




Figure 1.2 Adobe PageMaker window

The Adobe PageMaker window will be opened as shown in Figure 1.2

1.4 Creating a New Document


To create a new document,

- 1. Choose File > New in the menu bar. (or) Press Ctrl + N in the keyboard. Now Document Setup dialog box appears. (Figure 1.3)
- **2.** Enter the appropriate settings for your new document in the **Document Setup** dialog box.
- 3. Click on **OK** button.
- Chapter 01 Adobe Pagemaker




Figure 1.4 PageMaker Document Window

Now a new document called Untitled - 1 opens on the screen as shown in Figure 1.4.

Α document page is displayed within a dark border. The area outside of the dark border is referred to as the Pasteboard. Anything that is placed completely in the pasteboard is not visible when you print the document. You can use the pasteboard to temporarily hold elements while designing your document.

Figure 1.3 Document Setup dialog box

The main components of the above window are **Title bar, Menu bar, Toolbar, Ruler, Scroll bars and Text area.** Let us have a look at these components.

Title bar

It is the topmost part of the window. It shows the name of the software and the name of the document at the left, and the control buttons (Minimize, Maximize and Close) at the right.

In Figure 1.5 we can see the name of the software (Adobe PageMaker 7.0) at the left. It is followed by the default name of the document(Untitled-1) which can be changed when we save the document with a user-supplied name.

We know that on clicking the Minimize button the document window is minimised to a small icon and kept in the task bar, Maximise button is used for maximising the current document window to fit the whole screen area, and the Close button closes the software itself.

Menu bar

It contains the following menus File, Edit, Layout, Type, Element, Utilities, View, Window, Help. When you click on a menu item, a pulldown menu appears. There may be sub-menus under certain options in the pull-down menus.

Toolbar

If you place the mouse pointer on a button in the Toolbar, a short text will appear as its description called 'Tool Tip'.

Toolbox




Figure 1.8 Toolbox

The Figure 1.8 shows the PageMaker toolbox.

To move the Toolbox, drag the Toolbox by its **Title bar**. Select a tool from the default toolbox by clicking it.

If the Toolbox is not available on the screen, you can perform these steps to show the toolbox.

- 1. Click on **Window**. The Window menu will appear.
- 2. Click on Show tools.

The toolbox appears in front of your document window. If you want to hide the toolbar, you can perform these steps to hide the toolbox.

- 1. Click on **Window**. The Window menu will appear.
- **2.** Click on **Hide tools** to hide the toolbox.

Scroll bars

Scrolling is the process of moving up and down or left and right through the document window. There are two scroll bars namely Vertical and Horizontal scroll bars for scrolling the document vertically or horizontally.

Rulers

There are two ruler. One is at the top and the other is at the left side.

To show the ruler

- 1. Click on View. The View menu will appear.
- 2. Click on **Show Rulers**. Rulers appear along the top and left sides of the document window.

To hide the ruler

- 1. Click on **View**. The View menu will appear.
- 2. Click on **Hide Rulers** to hide the rulers.

1.5 **Entering Text in the Document**

In PageMaker the text of the document can be typed inside a text block. So, you must use the Text tool to create those text blocks. After creating a Text block, you can type the text directly into the text block. As the characters are typed, the flashing vertical bar called the insertion point, moves to the right. When the text being typed reaches the end of the text block, PageMaker will automatically wrap the text to the next line. The Enter key must not be pressed at the end of the each line in the text block. The Enter key should be pressed only at the end of a paragraph or when a blank line is to be inserted.

Editing Text in the Document

Editing means making changes to the text. When you edit a document, you revise its text. Editing encompasses many tasks, such as inserting and deleting words and phrases, correcting errors, and moving and copying text to different places in the document.

1.6.1 Selecting Text

Text can be selected using the mouse or the keyboard.

Selecting Text using the mouse

To select text using a mouse, follow these steps:

- 1. Place the Insertion point to the left of the first character to be selected.
- 2. Press the left mouse button and drag the mouse to a position where you want to stop selecting.
- 3. Release the mouse button.
- **4.** The selected text gets highlighted.

To Select	Press
A Word	Double-click with I-beam
A Paragraph	Triple-click with I-beam

Selecting Text using the Keyboard

To select text using a keyboard, follow these steps:

- 1. Place the Insertion point to the left of the first character you wish to select.
- 2. The Shift key is pressed down and the movement keys are used to highlight the required text.
- 3. When the Shift key is released, the text is selected.

1.6.2 Deleting Text

You can easily delete a character, or word, or block of text.

To delete a character, do the following:

- 1. Position the insertion point to the **left of the character** to be deleted.
- 2. Press **Delete key** on the keyboard. (or)
- 1. Position the insertion point to the right of the character to be deleted.
- **2.** Press **Backspace key** on the keyboard.

To delete a block of text, do the following:

- 1. Select the text to be deleted.
- 2. Press **Delete or Backspace** in the keyboard (or) in the menu bar choose **Edit** > **Clear**.

1.6.3 Undo Command

The **Undo** command is used to reverse the action of the last command. To reverse the last command, click on **Edit>Undo** in the menu bar (or) press **Ctrl** + **Z** in the keyboard.

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1.6.4 Copying and Moving Text

The **Copy** and **Paste** commands of PageMaker can be used to copy text from one location in a document and paste it at another location. The **Copy** command creates a duplicate of the selected text, leaving the original text unchanged. The **Paste** command pastes the copied text at the position where the insertion point is placed.

The **Cut** and **Paste** commands can be used to move text from one position in a document to the other. The **Cut** command deletes the selected text from its original position. The **Paste** command then places this text at the position where the insertion point is placed.

Moving the Text

The selected text can be easily cut and pasted in the required location.

To cut and paste text.

- 1. Select the text to be moved.
- Choose Edit > Cut in the menu bar.
 (or) Press Ctrl + X in the keyboard.
 (or) Click the right mouse button and choose cut from the pop-up menu.
- **3.** Insertion point is moved to the place where the text is to be pasted.
- 4. Choose Edit > Paste in the menu bar.(or) Press Ctrl + V in the keyboard.(or) Click the right mouse button and choose Paste from the pop-up menu.

The text can also be pasted in this way to another location or another type of document.

The following keyboard shortcuts can be used to move text

 $Ctrl + X \rightarrow Cut$

Ctrl + V → Paste



Copying the Text

The selected text can be easily copied and pasted in the required location.

To copy and paste text

- 1. Select the text to be coped.
- **2.** Choose **Edit** > **Copy** in the menu bar (or) Press Ctrl + C in the keyboard (or) Click the right mouse button and choose Copy from the pop-up menu.
- 3. Insertion point is moved to the place where the text is to be pasted.
- 4. Choose **Edit** > **Paste** in the menu bar (or) Press Ctrl + V in the keyboard (or) Click the right mouse button and choose Paste from the pop-up menu.

The text can also be pasted in this way to another location.

Keyboard shortcuts for copy and paste:

 $Ctrl + C \rightarrow Copy$

 $Ctrl + V \rightarrow Paste$

1.7 Text Block

A text block contains text you type, paste, or import. You can't see the borders of a text block until you select it with the pointer tool.

You create text blocks in two ways:

- 1. Click or drag the text tool on the page or pasteboard, and then type.
- 2. Click a loaded text icon in an empty column or page.

1.7.1 Creating a Text Block with the Text tool

To create a text block with the text tool:

1. Select the text tool (T) from the toolbox. The pointer turns into an I-beam.




Figure 1.9 I - beam



2. On an empty area of the page or pasteboard, do one of the following: Click the I-beam where you want to insert text. This creates a text block the width of the column or page. By default, the insertion point jumps to the left side of the text block.




Figure 1.10 Text block

3. Type the text you want.

Unlike with a text frame, you do not see the borders of a text block until you click the text with the pointer tool.




Figure 1.11 Creating a Text Block with the Text tool



1.7.2 Moving a Text Block

To move a block without changing its shape, place the cursor anywhere inside the block, and click and drag it to the required position.




Figure 1.12 Moving a Text Block

1.7.3 **Resizing a Text Block**

When you select a text block with the Pointer tool, the block's boundaries become visible. Two handles are seen above and below the text block. These handles are called Windowshades. There is a dark square on both ends of the handle. These are used to change the size of the text block.




Figure 1.13 Windowshades







To resize a Text block

- 1. Click on the Pointer tool.
- 2. Click either the left or right corner handle on the bottom of the text block and drag. When you release the mouse button, the text in the text block will reflow to fit the new size of the text block.




Figure 1.14 Resizing text block

3. A red triangle in the bottom windowshade means there is more text in the text block than visible on the page. Drag the windowshade handle down to show more text.




Figure 1.15 A red triangle in the bottom windowshade



1.7.4 Splitting a Text Block into two

To split a text block into two

1. Place the cursor on the bottom handle, click and drag upwards. When you release the bottom handle will contain a red triangle.




Figure 1.16 A red triangle in the bottom handle

2. Click once on this, and the cursor changes to a loaded text icon.




Figure 1.17 A loaded text icon



3. Position this where the second part of the text is to be, and click.




Figure 1.18 Splitting a Text block

1.7.5 Rejoining split blocks

To rejoin the two text blocks

- 1. Place the cursor on the bottom handle of the second text block, click and drag the bottom handle up to the top.
- 2. Then place the cursor on the bottom handle of the first text block, and click and drag the bottom handle down if necessary.

1.7.6 Placing (Importing) Text

You can insert text from other software program like MS-Word in the PageMaker document.

1. Choose **File** > **Place** in the menu bar. The **Place** dialog box will appear.





Figure 1.19 Place option in the File Menu







2. Locate the document that contains the text you want to place and select it.




Figure 1.20 Place dialog box

- **3.** Click on **Open** in the Place dialog box. The pointer changes to the loaded text icon ().
- 4. Make a text block to place the text. (Or) Click in the page to place the text. The text will be placed in the page.
 - If the text to be placed is too big to fit on one page, PageMaker allows you to place it on several pages. This can be done manually or automatically.

Manual text flow

- Position the loaded text icon at a corner of the area where you want to place text, hold down the mouse button, and drag to define the text block. Release the mouse button.
- Text flows into the defined area. If there is more text than fits in the text block you defined, a red triangle appears in the bottom windowshade handle.








Figure 1.21 A red triangle in the bottom windowshade handle

• Click once on this and the loaded text icon reappears. Now generate a new text block and click. Repeat this process until there is no more text to place.




Figure 1.22 Text blocks



Similarly if you want to place the text in a page, position the loaded text icon at the top of the page and click. Text flows into the page. If there is more text than fits in the page, a red triangle appears in the bottom windowshade handle.

Click once on this and the loaded text icon reappears. Now generate a new page (or pages) by selecting Layout > Insert Pages in the menu bar. Place the loaded text icon at the top of the next page and click. Repeat this process until there is no more text to place.

Automatic text flow

Before importing the text, first select Layout > Autoflow in the menu bar. Then you should import the text. Now the loaded text icon looks different - it contains a squiggly arrow(...).

Place the loaded text icon at the top of the page and click. But now the text will automatically flow on to the succeeding pages, creating new ones, if necessary.

1.8 Understanding story

A PageMaker story is similar to a newspaper article. The front page of a newspaper may contain several independent articles, some of which continue on other pages. In PageMaker, several stories may appear on the same publication page and continue elsewhere in the publication.

1.9 Threading text blocks

All text in PageMaker resides inside containers called text blocks.

A Text block can be connected to other text block so that the text in one text block can flow into another text block. Text blocks that are connected in this way are threaded. The process of connecting text among Text blocks is called threading text. Text that flows through one or more threaded blocks is called a story.

Once you have a loaded text icon, you can use one of three text-flow options to place text in text blocks.

To cancel a loaded text icon, click the pointer tool in the toolbox; no text is deleted.

A threaded text block can be identified by a plus sign in its top and/or bottom handles. Refer Figure 1.23-Fig 1.25

Unthreaded text is where a text block stands alone, without being connected to any other block. These blocks have nothing in their top and bottom handles.




Figure 1.24 Threaded text






Figure 1.25 Threading Text Blocks

1.9.1 To unthread a threaded block

Method - 1:

Select the block that you wish to unthread with the pointer tool. Click on **Edit** > **Cut** in the menu bar.(the block disappear). Now click on the **Edit** > **Paste** in the menu bar. The block will reappear in the same position, but it is now an unthreaded block.

BEWARE: if the block is in the middle of a story, say the second of the three, the first block is now threaded directly to the third.

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Method - 2:

Select the block that you wish to unthread with the pointer tool. Then choose the Text tool and select all the text in the block. Then click on **Edit** > **Cut** in the menu bar.(the block disappear). Now click the insertion point within an existing threaded block. Then click on **Edit** > **Paste** in the menu bar. The text will be added in this block.

1.10 Placing Text in a Frame




Figure 1.26 Placing text in a Frame

You can also use frames to hold text in place of using text blocks. Refer Figure 1.26



To place text in a Frame

- 1. Click on one of a Frame tool from the Toolbox.
- 2. Draw a frame with one of PageMaker's Frame tools (Rectangle frame tool or Ellipse Frame Tool or Polygon frame Tool). Make sure the object remains selected.
- 3. Click on File. The File menu will appear.

- **4.** Click on **Place**. The Place dialog box will appear.
- 5. Locate the document that contains the text you want to place, select it.
- **6.** Click on **Open**.
- 7. Click in a frame to place the text in

The text will be placed in the frame.

- In PageMaker, text and graphics that you draw or import are called objects.
- An object can be on a page or on the pasteboard.
- Text can be contained either in text blocks or text frames.











1.10.1 Linking Frames containing

A single frame may not be large enough to hold an entire story when you are using a large amount of text, you can link frames together so that an entire story is visible.

To link Frames containing text

- 1. Draw a second frame with the Frame tool of your choice.
- 2. Click the **first frame** to select it.
- 3. Click on the **red triangle** to load the text icon.
- 4. Click the **second frame**. PageMaker flows the text into the second frame.




Figure 1.27 Linking Frames containingText

1.10.2 Converting text in a Text block to a Frame

After created text in a text block, if you want to convert it to a frame. You can do this by using these steps.

- 1. Draw the **frame** of your choice using one of the PageMaker's Frame tool.
- 2. Select the text block you want to insert in the frame.
- 3. Click the frame while pressing the Shift key. Now both elements will be selected.
- 4. Choose Element > Frame > Attach **Content** on the Menu bar.






Figure 1.28 Converting text in a Text block to a Frame

- 5. Now the text appears in the frame. Refer Figure 1.28

1.10.3 Separating Text from the **Frame**

Once text has been attached to a frame or flowed inside it, you can separate the text and frame.

To separate text from a frame

- 1. Click the frame with the **Pointer** tool.
- 2. Choose Element > Frame > Delete Content in the menu bar. The text will not appear in the frame.

1.11 Saving, Closing and **Opening Documents**

The below section explains about various operations with the documents.

1.11.1 Saving a Document

You can save your document for future use. Saving a document allows you to review later and edit the document. Saved file can be used on other computer also.

To save a document for a first time following steps are used:

1. (a) Choose **File** > **Save** in the menu bar. (or)

Click on the **Save icon**(in the Tool bar. (or)

Press **Ctrl** + **S** in the Keyboard.





Figure 1.29 Save Publication dialog box

A Save Publication dialog box as shown in the Figure 1.29 appears on the screen.

- 2. The file name is given in the File name list box.
- 3. Then click on the Save button to save the document. The document is now saved and a file name appears in the title bar.





Once a file is saved under a name, to save it again the name need not be entered again. The file can be saved simply by selecting the **File** > **Save** command or by clicking the **Save** button (or) clicking **Ctrl** + **S** in the keyboard.

1.11.2 Saving a Document with a new name or in a different location

You can save a document with a new name or in a different location using **Save AS** command. **Save AS** command creates a new copy of the document. So, two versions of the document exist. The

versions are completely separate, and the work you do on one document has no effect on the other.

To save a document with a new name or in a different location:

- Choose File > Save As in the menu bar. (or) Press Shift + Ctrl + S in the keyboard.




Figure 1.30 Saving a Document with a new name or in a different location

 - Now **Save Publication** dialog box will appear. Refer Figure 1.30
- **2.** Type a new name or specify a new location.
- 3. Click on the Save button.

1.12 Closing a Document

After a document is saved, it is not closed. It remains open so that the user can continue working. When the work is finished, the user should save and close the document.

After saving, the document can be closed using the **File** > **Close** command in the menu bar (or) **Ctrl** +**W** in the keyboard.

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1.13 Opening an existing Document

To open a document that has been saved and closed the following steps are used:

(a) Choose File > Open in the menu bar (or)
 Click on the Open icon () in the Tool bar (or)





Press **Ctrl** + **O** in the Keyboard.




Figure 1.31 Open Publication dialog box

A Open Publication dialog box as shown in the Figure 1.31 appears on the screen.

2. The file name is given in the File name list box.

The name of the file to be opened can be chosen from the list, which is displayed.

3. Then click on the **Open** button. Now the required file is opened.

1.14 Moving Around the **Document**

We can move the insertion point to anywhere in the document by using the mouse or the Keyboard.

To move the insertion point with the mouse, the mouse pointer is moved to the required spot and the mouse button is clicked. The insertion point jumps to that spot. It is to note that mouse pointer is different from the insertion point.

To move the insertion point with the keyboard the arrow keys and other key combination can be used.

The Table 1.1 lists the common movement keys. If the key combination is joined with a plus sign, the first key must be pressed and held down and the second key is to be pressed.

Scrolling the Document

In PageMaker, there are two sets of scroll bars; one for up and down movement and the other for the left and right movement of the document.


PageMaker's scroll bars work differently than those in a word processor. Note that they are set to the center of each bar. Also, they scroll only the page you are currently on. Use the scroll bar on the right side to move up and down. Use the scroll bar at the bottom to move left and right.

The scrolling procedure is as follows:

1. To scroll left and right the left and right arrow respectively should be clicked.







- To scroll up and down the up and down arrow respectively should be clicked.
- **3.** To scroll a relative distance in the document the scroll box should be drawn up or down.

1.16 Magnifying and reducing with the zoom tool






Figure 1.32 Magnifying with the zoom tool

Use the zoom tool to magnify or reduce the display of any area in your publication. You can also double-click the zoom tool to jump to Actual Size, or press Alt as you double-click the tool to go to Fit in Window view. Refer Figure 1.32

To magnify or reduce with the zoom tool:

- 1. Select the zoom tool.
 - The pointer becomes a magnifying glass with a plus sign in its center, indicating that the zoom tool will magnify your view of the image. (The magnifying glass shows a minus sign in its center when in reduction mode.) To toggle between magnification and reduction, press the Ctrl key.
- 2. Position the magnifying glass at the center of the area you want to magnify or reduce, and then click to zoom in or out.
 - Continue clicking until the publication is at the magnification level you want. When the publication has reached its maximum magnification or reduction level, the center of the magnifying glass appears blank.

To magnify part of a page by dragging:

- 1. Select the zoom tool.
- 2. Drag to draw a marquee around the area you want to magnify.

To zoom in or out while using another tool:

Press **Ctrl+Spacebar** to zoom in. Press **Ctrl+Alt+Spacebar** to zoom out.

1.17 Formatting a Document

Formatting is the process of changing the general arrangement of text, i.e., improving the appearance of the text by using various fonts, fonts colors, and font styles. A font is a set of letters, numbers or symbols in a certain style. Each font looks different from other fonts.



1.17.1 Character Formatting using Character **Specifications Dialog Box**




Figure 1.33 Character Specifications dialog box




Figure 1.34 Character Control Palette




Figure 1.35 Modifying character attributes using the Character Control Palette

Character formatting means displaying text in a certain way. Character formatting consists of text properties - bold, italic, underline, font type, font size, font colour, etc. Refer Figure 1.33, 1.34 and 1.35

The steps to apply character formatting to text are as follows:

- 1. Select the text to be formatted.
- 2. Choose Type > Character in menu bar (or) Press Ctrl + T on the keyboard.

The **Character Specifications** dialog box appears.

- 3. Make the appropriate changes in the dialog box.
 - Click the drop-down menu arrow of the Font box and select the desired font.
 - Click the drop-down menu arrow of the Font Size box and select the font size.
 - Click the drop-down menu arrow of the Font Color box and select the desired colour.
 - Click the Bold, Italic, or Underline buttons to make the text bold, italic, or underlined respectively.
- 4. Click on OK.

1.17.2 Character Formatting using the **Control Palette**

The Control Palette is especially useful when you are doing lot of formatting.

Its features change based on the object that is selected on your layout.

If the Control palette is not showing then use the following steps:

- 1. Click on Window > Show Control Palette sequence in the menu bar. (or)
- 2. Press **Ctrl** + 'in the keyboard. Now the Control Palette appears on the window.



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To modify character attributes using the Character Control Palette:

- 1. Select the text you want to modify.
- 2. Make the appropriate changes in the Control palette. Refer Figure 1.34

1.17.3 Changing Text Colour


You can change the colour of the text. Your design may look beautiful if you choose a text colour other than black.

To colour characters

- 1. Select the text you want to colour.
- 2. Choose Window > Show Colors in Menu bar. The Colors palette appears.

Click the colour you want to apply to the selected text.

The characters change to the colour you selected in the palette.






Figure 1.36 Changing Text Colour

1.18 Drawing

There are so many drawing tools in PageMaker. Line tool, Rectangle tool, Ellipse tool and Polygon tool are four main drawing tools.

1.18.1 Drawing Lines

PageMaker has two Line tools. The first one creates a straight line at any orientation. The second is a constrained line tool that draws only at increments of 45 degrees. You can change the property of tools by double-clicking on them.

To draw a straight line

- 1. Select the Line tool from the toolbox. The cursor changes to a crosshair.
- 2. Click and drag on the screen to draw your line. As you drag, a line appears.







-
- **3.** Release the mouse button and the line will be drawn and selected, with sizing handles on either end.
 - Resize the line by clicking and dragging the handles, if necessary.




Figure 1.37 A straight Line

To draw a Dotted line

1. Double click the **Line tool** from the toolbox. A **Custom Stroke** dialog box appears.




Figure 1.38 Custom Stroke dialog box

2. Select the required **Stroke style** in the drop-down list box.




Figure 1.39 Stroke style drop-down list box

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- **3.** Then click OK button. Now the cursor changes to a crosshair.
- **4.** Click and drag on the screen to draw your dotted line. As you drag, the line appears.
- 5. Release the mouse button and the line will be drawn and selected, with sizing handles on either end.

 Resize the line by clicking and dragging the handles, if necessary.




Figure 1.40 Dotted line

1.18.2 Drawing a Rectangle or an Ellipse

You can also draw rectangles and ellipses shapes by using the same technique as used in line drawing.

- 1. To draw a rectangle or an ellipse: Click on the **Rectangle** or **Ellipse tool** from the toolbox.
 - The cursor changes to a **crosshair**.
- 2. Click and drag anywhere on the screen. As you drag, a rectangle or ellipse appears.
- **3.** Release the mouse button when the rectangle or ellipse is of the desired size.

Press the **Shift key** while you're drawing to constrain the shape to a square or circle.








Figure 1.41 Drawing a Rectangle and an Ellipse - Drawing a square and a circle

Drawing a Rounded Corner Rectangle

To draw a rounded-corner rectangle:

- 1. Double-click the Rectangle tool in the toolbox.
 - The Rounded Corners dialog box appears.
- 2. Choose a corner setting from the preset shapes.
- 3. Click on OK. The cursor changes to a crosshair.
- 4. Click and drag anywhere on the screen.
- 5. Release the mouse button when the rectangle is the desired size.
 - Press the **Shift key** as you draw to constrain the shape to a roundedcorner square.




Figure 1.42 Drawing a Rounded Corner Rectangle

1.18.3 **Drawing a Polygon**

To draw a Polygon

- 1. Click on the **Polygon tool** from the toolbox.
 - The cursor changes to a **crosshair**.
- 2. Click and drag anywhere on the screen. As you drag, a Polygon appears.
- 3. Release the mouse button when the Polygon is of the desired size.




Figure 1.43 Drawing a Polygon

- **1.** Click on the **Polygon tool** from the toolbox.
 - The cursor changes to a **crosshair**.

- **4.** Choose **Element** > **Polygon Settings** in the menu bar.




Figure 1.44 Polygon settings in the Element Menu




Figure 1.45 Polygon settings dialog box





Figure 1.46 A Star




Figure 1.47 A Star with 15 sides and 50% inset




Figure 1.48 A Star with 25 sides and 25% inset




Figure 1.49 A Star with 70 sides and 35% inset




Figure 1.50 Show colors option in the Window Menu




Figure 1.51 Filling Shapes with Colors

1.19 Working with pages

The main purpose of PageMaker is composing pages. You can insert new pages into a document, remove existing pages, move between pages, and sort pages in a large document.

Going to a 1.19.1 specific Page

PageMaker provides several methods for navigating the pages in your publication.

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Method 1:

You can move from one page to another by using the **Page up** and **Page down** keys on your keyboard. This is probably the navigation methods you will use most often.

Method 2:

You can move from one page to another by using the page icons at the left bottom of the screen. Click on the page icon that corresponds to the page that you want to view. The page is displayed.

Method 3:




Figure 1.52 Go to page option in the Layout Menu




Figure 1.53 Go to Page dialog box

Using the Go to Page dialog box. Refer Figure 1.52 and 1.53

To go to a specific page in a document

Choose Layout > Go to Page in the menu bar (or) Press Alt + Ctrl + G in the keyboard.

Now the **Go to Page** dialog box appears.

1.19.2 Inserting Pages

You can add more pages to a document. You can insert pages before, after, or between the pages you're currently viewing. When you insert pages, PageMaker automatically renumbers the pages in your publication.

To insert pages

- 1. Go to the page immediately before the page you want to insert.
- 2. Choose Layout > Insert Pages in the menu bar.




Figure 1.54 Insert Page option in the Layout Menu

The Insert Pages dialog box appears.




Figure 1.55 Insert pages dialog box

- **3.** Type the number of pages you want to insert.
- **4.** To insert pages after the current page, choose 'after' from the pop-up menu.

1.19.3 Removing Pages

You can remove the unused pages from your document with a Remove Pages dialog box.

1. Choose Layout > Remove Pages in the menu bar. The Remove Pages dialog box appears.




Figure 1.56 Remove pages option in the Layout

1.20 **Master Pages**

Any text or object that you place on the master page will appear on the entire document pages to which the master is applied. It shortens the amount of time because you don't have to create the same objects repeatedly on subsequent pages.

Master Pages commonly contain repeating logos, page numbers, headers, and footers. They also contain nonprinting layout guides, such as column guides, ruler guides, and margin guides.

A master item cannot be selected on a document page.

You can create, modify, and delete objects on master pages just like any other objects, but you must do so from the master pages themselves.

At the lower left corner of a document (publication) window you can find an icon which represents the master pages. The letters L and R (L denotes left and R denotes right) mark the master page icon for facing pages. A single-sided publication icon is marked by an R alone.




Figure 1.58 Master Pages Icon

Inserting Page Numbers 1.20.1 in Mater Pages

To make page numbers appear on every page


- 1. Click on Master Pages icon.
- 2. Then click on Text Tool. Now the cursor changes to I - beam.
- 3. Then click on the left Master page where you want to put the page number.

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- **4.** Press Ctrl + Alt + P.
- 5. The page number displays as 'LM' on the left Master Page.
- 6. Similarly click on the right Master page where you want to put the page number.
- 7. Press Ctrl + Alt + P.
- **8.** The page number displays as 'RM' on the right Master Page, but will appear correctly on the actual pages.






Figure 1.59 Inserting Page Numbers in Mater Pages

1.20.2 Hiding Master Items

To make the master items invisible on a particular page, switch to the appropriate page, then choose **View** > **Display Master items** (which is usually ticked).




Figure 1.60 DisplayMaser Items in the View Menu

1. Choose Window> Show Master Pages in the menu bar. The Master Pages Palette appears.





Figure 1.61 Show Master Pages in the Window Menu








Figure 1.62 Master Pages Palette

1.20.4 Creating Master Pages

By default, all PageMaker documents have a Master Page already created 'Document Master'. But sometimes you will require more than one Master Page.

You can set up multiple Master Pages for any publication, each page containing a specific combination of headers, footers, page numbers, frames, and other elements that you want to use over and over.

When you create a new Master Page, you will be asked to name the new Master page and set its margins and column guides.

To create a new Master Page

- 1. Click the New Master Page icon in the Master Pages palette. The New Master Page dialog box appears.
- 2. Enter the name of the new Master Page in the Name field.
- 3. Make the appropriate changes in the Margins and Column Guides fields.
- **4.** Click on OK button. A new Master Page appears in the Master Pages palette.

1.21 Print a document

- Choose File > Print in the menu bar (or) Press Ctrl + P in the keyboard. The Print Document dialog box appears.
- **2.** Choose the settings in the Print Document dialog box as
 - Select the printer from the **Printer** drop-down list box.
 - Choose the pages to be printed in the **Pages** group box by selecting one of the following available options:

All: This option prints the whole document.

Ranges: This option prints individual pages by the page number or a range of pages.

You can use commas to separate the page numbers

(e.g., 5,7,19).

Use a hyphen to print page ranges(e.g., 10-17; this will print all pages from page numbers 10 to 17).

To print from a particular page to the end of the document, enter the starting page number followed by a hyphen (e.g., 5 -).

You may also combine individual page numbers and a range of pages (e.g., 5, 9, 15-26).

Print: You can also print only oddnumbered or even-numbered pages. Select the Odd pages or Even pages option from the Print drop-down list box.




Figure 1.65 Print Document dialog box





- Type the number of copies you want in the **Copies** text box.
- You can choose whether to **collate** the pages or not. Suppose you want to print 4 copies of a 5 pages document.

If the **Collate** option is not selected. PageMaker will first print 4 copies of page 1, then 4 copies of page 2, and so on.

- If the **Collate** option is selected, PageMaker will print a complete set of pages 1 to 5, then a second set, and so on.
- 3. After choosing from the options in the **Print Document** dialog box, click **Print** button to print the document. Make sure the printer is switched on.

POINTS TO REMEMBER

- Desktop publishing (abbreviated DTP) is the creation of page layouts for documents using DTP software.
- Some of the popular DTP software are Adobe PageMaker, Adobe InDesign, QuarkXPress, etc.
- Adobe PageMaker is **a page layout software**. It is used to design and produce documents that can be printed.
- The area outside of the dark border is referred to as the pasteboard.
- Editing means making changes to the text. When you edit a document, you revise its text.
- A text block contains text you type, paste, or import. You cannot see the borders of a text block until you select it with the pointer tool.
- A Text block can be connected to other text block so that the text in one text block can flow into another text block. Text blocks that are connected in this way are **threaded**.
- The process of connecting text among Text blocks is called **threading text**.
- Text that flows through one or more threaded blocks is called a **story**.
- Any text or object that you place on the master page will appear on the entire document pages to which the master is applied.
- Master Pages commonly contain repeating logos, page numbers, headers, and footers.
- A master item cannot be selected on a document page.



2.1 Introduction

Adobe InDesign CC 2019 is a part of the Adobe Creative Cloud family of software programs.

InDesign is a page layout software program used to design and produce documents that can be printed or used on the Web. You can create anything from a simple business card to a large book.

If we are working towards a career as a Web designer, knowledge of InDesign is a must.

2.2 **Understanding Page Layout Software**

Adobe InDesign is a page layout software program. Page layout software includes tools that allow you to easily position text

and graphics on document pages. For example, using InDesign, you could create a newsletter that includes articles and pictures on each page. You can place pictures and text next to each other, on top of each other, or beside each other-wherever you want them to go. If you can imagine what you want or need on paper, you can create it in

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InDesign as long as you are familiar with its tools and features.

2.3 Using InDesign, you can accomplish the following

Create and place text

You can create text in InDesign and then format it. In addition to choosing fonts and font sizes, you can change the color of text and control the spacing between each character. You can also place text from another source, such as Microsoft Word, in an InDesign document.

Create and place graphics

You can create simple graphics in InDesign with the shape tools and the Pen tool. You can also place illustrations and photographs from other programs, such as Illustrator and Photoshop, in InDesign documents.

Choose from many colors

InDesign contains many color samples, called swatches, to choose from. The Swatches panel includes the basic colors used for printed materials. There are also other color libraries to choose from for special purposes.

For example, there is a library of Web colors for documents created for the Web.

Position objects easily

InDesign offers many features that help you position text and graphics with accuracy. You can snap objects to ruler guides or a grid. You can also use the Transform panel and the Control panel to define an object's width, height, rotation angle, and vertical and horizontal location. The Align panel

allows you to align and distribute objects by their tops, bottoms, centers, or sides.

Store items

Libraries are storage containers for items that you use repeatedly and want easy access to when working in InDesign. Company logos, legal jargon, and contact information are good examples of items to store in a library. Libraries look just like panels, but they are actually InDesign documents that are saved with the .indl extension. Libraries are not linked to one InDesign document; they can be opened and used with any InDesign documents.

Create interactive buttons and hyperlinks

In InDesign, you can use buttons and hyperlinks to design clickable areas in a document that link to a Web page, another file, or another page in our document. Hyperlinks and buttons that are created in InDesign become usable (clickable) when you export an InDesign document as an Adobe **PDF** (Portable Document Format) document or as a Web format.

Export documents

You can export an InDesign document as another file type so that it can be used in another program. For example, you can export an InDesign document as a Flash Player file (SWF) or as a Flash Professional CS5 file (FLA).




Figure 2.3 Welcome to InDesign window




Figure 2.4 New Document window

When you create a new document, you have the opportunity to set many options in the **New Document dialog box**.

To set the basic options for a new document:

• In the **New Document** dialog box, click a category tab: **Print, Web,** or **Mobile**.




Figure 2.5 New Document dialog box

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Specify the following options for the selected preset:

Width and Height: Specify the size of the document.

Units: Specify the measurement unit for the document.

Orientation: Specify a page orientation for the document: Landscape or Portrait.

Pages: Specify the number of pages to create in the document.

Facing pages: If you're creating a single-sided document—like an advertisement, poster, or handbill-leave Facing Pages turned off. Turn it on for books and magazines, which usually have both left-hand and right-hand pages.

Start#: Specify which number the document starts on. If you specify an even number (such as 2) with Facing Pages selected, the first spread in the document begins with a two-page spread.

Primary Text Frame: Select this option to add a primary text frame on the master page.

Columns: Specify the number of columns to add in the document.

Column Gutter: Specify the amount of whitespace between columns.

Margins: Specify the margins for each side of the document. To use different values for different sides, delink the dimensions by clicking the chain icon.

Bleed and Slug: Specify the position of the bleed and slug along each side of the document. To use different values for different sides, delink the dimensions by clicking the chain icon.

4. Click the **Create** button to open a document with the preset settings.




Figure 2.6 Document Window









2.5 Exploring the InDesign Workspace

A workspace is where your work is created. Workspaces typically include an area designated for creating a finished product, much like a painter would use a canvas to create a painting.

When you start InDesign for the first time, you see the default workspace, called "Essentials," with the Control panel and Tools panel along the top and left side of the InDesign window. The arrangement of windows and panels that you see on your monitor is called the workspace. The InDesign workspace features the following areas: the document window, pasteboard, Application bar, Control panel, Tools panel, and a stack of collapsed panels.




Figure 2.7 Essentials workspace

Figure 2.7 shows the default workspace, which is called **Essentials**.

InDesign CC 2019 offers a number of predefined workspaces that are customized for different types of tasks. Each workspace in InDesign is designed so that panels with similar functions are grouped together. For example, the Typography workspace shows the many type- and typography-based panels that are useful for working with type. You can switch from one workspace to another by clicking Window on the application bar, pointing to Workspace, and then choosing a workspace.

Application bar

The Application bar sits at the top of the workspace and includes several menus. To open a menu, click the menu name on the Application bar. Each menu lists commands that relate to the menu category. To the right of the menu names are workspace and view options.




Figure 2.8 Application bar

Control panel

The Control panel is located directly beneath the Application bar and above the horizontal ruler. Options in the Control panel change depending on what is selected in the document. For instance, if your insertion point is flashing in text, you'll see text options in the Control panel; if you use the black Selection Tool to select a graphic object, you'll see different options for manipulating the graphic.

Document tab

The document tab appears just above ruler horizontal and includes name, its the document's current magnification level, and a Close button. When more than one document is open, a tab appears for each document and the document tabs appear in a horizontal row. Click a document tab to view that document in the window. You can drag a document tab out of the group to open it in a stand-alone window.

Tools panel

The Tools panel contains the tools available in InDesign. There are tools for creating objects, such as the Rectangle tool, tools for transforming objects, such as the Rotate tool, and tools for changing the page view and navigating the workspace, such as the Zoom tool and the Hand tool. Some tools have a small triangle in the lower-right corner. This indicates that additional tools are available beneath that tool. Click and hold the tool to see the hidden tools.

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Panels

Panels are small windows that contain options for working with selected objects. You make choices in panels by clicking buttons, choosing items from lists, or using a command on the panel menu. Panels are positioned on the right side of the workspace and are identified by a name and an icon.

Document window

The document window is the central area that represents the open InDesign document. It resembles a piece of paper and is surrounded by a black border. The black border represents the **page border**.

Pasteboard

The pasteboard is the gray area surrounding the document window. You can place items on the pasteboard before actually inserting them on the page. You can use areas of the pasteboard for temporary storage of the elements you're working with—just drag the elements off the page, and they'll stay on the pasteboard until you need them.

Rulers

The horizontal and vertical rulers run along the top and left sides of the document window and pasteboard area. They are helpful for measuring and positioning objects.

Status bar

The status bar is at the bottom of the workspace. The status bar gives you the status of what is going on at the moment. For example, the status bar shows which page is active in a multipage document.

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2.6 Naming and Saving a Document

Saving your work is very important so that you don't lose anything that you've created.

To save a document, click **File** on the Application bar, and then click **Save**.

The first time that you save a new document, the **Save As dialog box** opens, asking you to name the document and to choose a location in which to store it.

Once saved, the new filename, followed by the InDesign filename extension .indd, appears on the document tab.

Once a document is named and saved, you should continue to save your work on a regular basis, such as every 10 minutes. You save the new document with a unique name.




Figure 2. 9 File Menu








Figure 2. 10 Save As dialog box

2.7 Opening an existing Document

When you choose Open from the File menu, or press Ctrl + O, InDesign displays the Open a File dialog box (see Figure 2.11). Locate and select the InDesign document you want to open, then click the Open button and InDesign opens the selected document in a new window.

2.8 Tools Panel

The Tools panel contains selection tools, tools for drawing basic shapes, pathdrawing and editing tools, transformation tools, text editing tools, navigation tools, and object formatting tools. By default, the Tools panel is docked under the Control panel. All tools are found in the Tools panel, located along the left side of your document window.

If you place the cursor over any tool in the Tools panel without clicking, a **tooltip** appears displaying the tool's name and a keyboard shortcut in parentheses.

You can activate a tool by clicking its icon, or by typing its assigned keyboard shortcut (which is included in the tooltip).

The first thing that you should note about the Tools panel is that not all tools are visible; many are hidden. Look closely and you will see that ten tools have small white triangles in the bottom-right corner. These triangles indicate that other tools are hidden behind them.

To access hidden tools, point to the visible tool in the Tools panel, then press and hold the mouse button; this will reveal a fly- out menu of hidden tools. The small white square to the left of a tool name in the fly-out menu indicates the tool that is currently visible in the Tools panel.

2.9 Using the Tools Panel

Selection Tool ()

Selection tool is used **to select objects or groups of objects**. Press **V** in the keyboard to select the Selection tool (when the cursor is not in text). When any other




Figure 2.12 InDesign CC Tools panel

tool is selected in the Tools panel, you can temporarily switch to the Selection tool by holding down **Ctrl**.

You can **Shift-click** to add additional objects to your selection or remove objects from an existing selection.

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


Figure 2.13 InDesign CC Tools panel

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

Ctrl-clicking allows you to select objects hidden under other objects, which is an invaluable technique when you're working with crowded layouts.

Direct Selection Tool ()

The Direct Selection tool(press A) is used to select single object out of a group (several individual objects grouped together with the Object, Group command) or to select

one or more points on a path of a single object.

Page Tool ()

The Page tool is used for creating different page sizes within a document. To create a different page size, press **Shift+P** to select the Page tool, and click the page in the layout to select it. Then use the options in the Control page to change the page layout.




Figure 2.15 Page Tool

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Gap Tool (►)

The Gap tool is used to adjust the spacing between objects. Press U to select the Gap tool, place the pointer between objects, and drag to change the gap between aligned objects. Shift-drag to move the gap between only the two nearest objects; Ctrl-drag to resize the gap instead of moving it; Alt-drag to move the gap and objects in the same direction. Ctrl+Alt-drag to resize the gap and move the objects. Adding the Shift key to any combination affects only the two nearest objects.






Figure 2. 16 Gap Tool

Content Collector Tool ()

When you select the Content Collector tool, click objects or stories to add them to the Content Conveyor at the bottom of the screen. You can then use the Content Placer Tool to copy and link these objects from the Content Conveyer into another layout or document. Press **B** to switch between the **Content Collector** and **Content Placer** tools.





Figure 2.17 Using the Content Collector tool



Type Tool ()

The Type tool is used to enter and edit text. To create a text frame, select the Type tool and drag the tool in the document window. To select the Type tool, press T. When you have the Selection or Direct Select tool chosen in the Tool panel, you can switch to the Type tool automatically by doubleclicking any text frame. InDesign places the text cursor as close as possible to where you double-clicked.



Path Type Tool ()

The Path Type tool is used to enter and edit text on a path (Adobe calls this the "Type on a Path" tool). To add text on a path, select the Path Type tool and click the tool on a path. A flashing text insertion point (or text cursor) appears on the path. At this point, text you enter will flow along the path. To select the Path Type tool, press Shift +T.

Note Tool ()

You use the Note tool to add non-printing notes to text. Click the Note tool in text, and InDesign will display a window you can use to enter the text of the note, or to jump to the next or previous notes in the document.

Pen Tool ()

The Pen tool is used to draw paths containing both straight and curved line segments (that is, paths containing both curve and corner points). Press P to select

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the Pen tool. Click and drag to create a series of connecting points that result in a custom drawn line or shape.

Under the Pen tool, you'll find the Add Anchor Point tool, the Delete Anchor Point tool, and the Convert Direction Point tool.

Add Anchor Point tool (



When you click the Add Anchor Point tool on a selected path, InDesign adds a point at that location on the path.

Delete Anchor Point tool ()




When you click the Delete Anchor Point tool on a point on a selected path, InDesign deletes it.

Convert Direction Point tool (



When you click the Convert Direction Point tool on a point on a selected path, InDesign converts the point to the other kind of point—if the point you click is a corner point, InDesign converts it to a curve point; if it's a curve point, InDesign converts it to a corner point. You can also use the Convert Direction Point tool to adjust the direction handles of a point.



Pencil Tool (

The Pencil tool (press N) is used to sketch free form paths. As you drag, it creates a path that follows the cursor, automatically placing points and adjusting control handles as it does so.



If you don't like something about a path you've drawn using the Pencil tool, you can adjust it using any of InDesign's other drawing tools. You might want to start with the other tools that share the same space in the Tools panel: the Smooth tool and the Eraser tool.

Smooth Tool ()

First select a path and then drag the Smooth tool over it. It'll get smoother. Not smooth enough yet? Drag again. As you drag the Smooth tool, it adjusts the points and control handles that define the path to create a smoother transition from one line segment to another. It often removes points during this process. If you continue to repeat the smoothing process, we think you'll eventually end up with a simple curve between two points.

Eraser Tool ()

The Eraser tool erases line segments and points. To use the Eraser tool, select a path, then drag the eraser tool over part of the path. It splits the path and removes




Figure 2.18 Object Menu

the line segments and points where you dragged the Eraser tool.

Line Tool (

The Line tool is used to draw straight lines paths containing two corner points. If you hold down Shift as you drag the Line tool, the lines you draw will be constrained to 0-, 45-, and 90-degree angles. Press \ (backslash) to select the Line tool.

Ellipse Tool ()

The Ellipse tool draws ovals and circles. To draw an oval, click and drag. To draw a circle, press the **Shift** key while dragging.

Rectangle Tool ()

The Rectangle tool draws both rectangles and squares. To draw a rectangle, click and drag. To constrain that rectangle to a square, press the Shift key while dragging (be sure to keep it pressed until you release the mouse button).

If you need a rectangle with rounded corners, draw the rectangle using the Rectangle tool, then choose Corner Options from the Object menu to display the Corner Options dialog box. The Corner options dialog box provides a variety of other corner shapes.




Figure 2.19 Corner Options dialog box





Polygon Tool

The Polygon tool is used to draw equilateral polygons, such as pentagons, hexagons, and dodecagons. Polygons are closed geometric objects that have at least three sides; they are equilateral if all sides are the same length.




Figure 2.20 Polygon Settings Dialog box

The Polygon tool is also used to draw stars. To draw a star, double-click on the Polygon tool in the Tools panel. The Polygon Settings dialog box appears (see Figure 2.20). You can enter the number of sides you want in the Number of Sides field. If you want the polygon to be a star polygon, enter a percentage (from 0 to 99 percent) in the Star Inset field. If you don't want the polygon to be a star polygon, enter 100 percent in the Star Inset field.




Figure 2.21 Polygon

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2.10 Zooming

Some of your work in InDesign will require that you view an object—or even just part of an object—at a very high magnification, or zoom.

Zooming allows you to quickly zoom in on, or get closer to, any object in or area of your document. You can also zoom out, or get farther away from your document, when you need to see everything at once.

You can magnify or reduce the view of the document from 5% to 4000%. You have several options for changing view magnification.

You can zoom in and out using:

- The Zoom tool
- The zoom commands in the View menu: Zoom In, Zoom Out, Fit Page in Window, Fit Spread in Window, Actual Size, and Entire Pasteboard.
- The Zoom Level pop-up menu in the left side of the application bar

Using the Zoom tool

The zoom tool is frequently used for enlarging or reducing the view of the document during the editing process.

To magnify the view of the document:

Select the Zoom tool from the Tool panel and position it over the area you want to zoom. Now you can see a plus sign at the center of the zoom tool. A single mouse click changes the view to the next preset magnification, Suppose you were to click again, then the view of the area that you clicked upon will get magnified again and the page would be centered at the point where you clicked.








Figure 2. 22 View Menu

In addition to this, you can drag a marquee with the zoom tool, on the area you want to magnify. The percentage of the magnified area depends on the size of the marquee. The smaller the marquee, the larger will be the level of magnification.

Using the view commands

- Choose **View > Zoom In** for magnifying to the next preset percentage.
- Choose **View > Zoom Out** for reducing and retracting to the previous preset percentage.
- Choose View > Actual Size for the document to be displayed at 100%.
- Choose View > Fit page in Window for scaling the view size to match the monitor size.
- Choose View > Fit Spread in Window for displaying the targeted spread in the window.

Choose View > Entire Pasteboard for displaying the current page or spread and its surrounding pasteboard that are visible within the document window

Using the Zoom Level pop-up menu

Choose a zoom percentage from the **Zoom** Level pop-up menu. You can also type a percentage in the Zoom level box.

Using the keyboard

- Press **Ctrl**+= to zoom in.
- Press **Ctrl**+- to zoom out.
- Press Ctrl+1 to view a page at actual size.
- Press **Ctrl+2** to view a page at 200%.
- Press Ctrl+0 to fit the entire page in the document window.
- Press Alt+Ctrl+0 to fit the entire spread in the document window.

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• Press **Ctrl+Spacebar** or **Ctrl+Alt+Spacebar** to temporarily access the Zoom tool and zoom in or out.

2.11 Navigating Pages

When we create a layout for a book, magazine, or brochure, we create a document that has multiple pages.

Spreads are two pages that face each other; a left page and a right page in a multipage document.

For navigating to pages or spreads in our document we have a variety of methods.

1. The **Go to Page** command in the **Layout** menu gives us the option to go to the page to which we want to go.




Figure 2. 23 Go to Page option in the Layout menu










2. The use of scroll bars on the bottom and right sides of the document window or choosing a page from the Page menu in the lower-left corner of the document window can be done.



3. There are also First Spread, Previous Spread, Next Spread and Last Spread buttons at the bottom of the document window, which we can click to navigate to designated spreads, as shown in Figure 2.26.




Figure 2. 26 Page buttons and the Page menu



2.12 Opening and closing the Tools panel

To open or close the Tools panel

- Choose Window > Tools to close the Tools panel. To reopen the Tools panel, choose Window > Tools again. (or)
- Press **Tab** key (with any tool but the Type tool selected) to close all open panels, including the Tools panel. To reopen those panels, press **Tab** again.

We can also close a floating Tools panel by clicking its **Close box**.




Figure 2.27 Tools option in the Window Menu

2. 13 Working with Text

InDesign has two main type tools: Type and Type on a Path. The Type tool is used to create a rectangle text frame where you can store text in your document. The Type on a Path tool is used to add text along the inner or outer edge of a path. In addition to the type tools, you can also use the Frame tools—Rectangle, Ellipse, and Polygon—to add text to your document.

The **default font** is **Minion Pro Regular**.

Use Type Tools

- 1. Click the Type tool slot on the Tools panel.
 - Click the arrow on the right of the Type tools menu to create a detachable panel.
- **2.** Click one of the following Type tools:
 - Type. Creates a text frame box.
 - Type on a Path. Creates text along the outer edge of an open or closed path.
- 3. For the Type tool, drag to draw a text frame. For the Type on a Path tool, click on a path.
- **4.** Type some text.




Figure 2. 29 Type and Type on a Path





2.13.1 Creating Text Boxes

Text boxes, also referred to as text frames, are containers for text. When you create a text box, a flashing cursor appears in the upper-left corner of the box, ready for you to start typing. The amount of text you can fit horizontally in a text box depends on the size of the text box because text automatically wraps to the next line once it hits the right side of the text box. You can copy and paste text from another source into InDesign or place a text file in an InDesign document using the **Place** command.

Creating Type in a Text Frame

With the Type tool, you can create a rectangle text box the size that you want.

- 1. Select the Type tool on the Tools panel.
- 2. Drag to create a rectangle text box the size that you want.
 - A flashing insertion point appears in the text frame.
- 3. Now start typing. The text automatically wraps to the shape of the text frame. Press **Enter** key if you want to start a new line.

If you type more text than the frame can hold, an overflow symbol (a tiny red plus sign in a square) appears on the edge of the rectangle box. You can reshape the text frame object to display the text or create a thread (link) to another text frame.

If the overflow symbol appears, deselect the text frame, select the Selection tool on the Tools panel, and then drag a corner to reshape the text frame.

2. 13. 2 Creating Type Using Frame Tools

In addition to the Type tool, you can also use the Frame tools— Rectangle, Ellipse, and Polygon— to add text to your document. Instead of a rectangle shape for type, you can create irregular shapes to store text in your document. The Polygon Frame tool is also used to create a star shape for type.

Create a Rectangle or Elliptical Frame for Type

- 1. Select the Rectangle / Ellipse / Polygon Frame tool on the Tools panel.
- 2. Drag to create a rectangle or elliptical or polygon frame the size that you want.

To create a frame to an exact size, click a blank area and immediately Rectangle / Ellipse / Polygon dialog box appears. In it, specify the width and height you want, and then click OK button.





3. Select the Type tool on the Tools panel.

Click in the frame, and then type some text. The text automatically wraps to the shape of the text frame. Press Enter key if you want to start a new line.

If the overflow symbol appears, deselect the text frame, select the Selection tool on the Tools panel, and then drag a corner to reshape the text frame.




Figure 2. 31 Creating a Rectangle / Elliptical / Polygon Frame for Type

2.13.3 Creating Path Type

With the Type on a Path tool, you can add type along the inner or outer edge of a path. You can place the text on either side of the path, but not on both. If you initially place it on the inner part of the path, you can always move it to the outer part of the path later. When you select text on a path, brackets appear that you can drag to adjust the position and placement of the text.

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Create Type on a Path

- 1. Select the Type on a Path tool on the Tools panel.
- 2. Click on the edge of the path (closed or open) to which you want to add type.

 A flashing insertion point appears in the text frame. Any fill or stroke on the object is removed.
- **3.** Type some text. The text automatically wraps to the shape of the text frame. Don't press **Enter** key.

The type appears along the edge of the object, conforms to its shape, and removes the fill and stroke.

If the overflow symbol appears, deselect the text frame, select the Direct Selection tool on the Tools panel, and then drag a corner to reshape the text frame.

4. Select a Selection tool or select the Type tool again.




Figure 2. 32 Creating Type on a Path









2.13.4 Importing Text

If you have text from another document that you want to use in your InDesign document, you can use the Place command to import it. You can import text from the following text formats: plain text (TXT), Rich Text Format (RTF), Microsoft Word (DOC or DOCX), or Microsoft Excel (XLS or XLSX). When you import text using the Place command on the File menu, InDesign allows you to place the text in a new text frame or an existing one.

Follow these steps to place text into a document:

- 1. Choose **File** > **Place** in the menu bar. **Place** dialog box appears.
- 2. Locate the text file you want to place, select it and click the Open button on the right side of the **Place dialog box**.




Figure 2. 33 (a) Place option in the File Menu

3. Your cursor changes to the loaded text cursor, indicating that the text is ready to be placed into your document.








Figure 2. 33 (b) Place dialog box

- **4.** Either click to place the text (filling the current column from the point at which you clicked to the end of the page) or click and drag to create a new text frame.
- 5. If a text frame cannot contain all the text placed within it, a red plussign overflow symbol appears on the lower-right border of the text frame.

Clicking this overflow symbol loads the remaining text into your cursor for placement in an additional text frame. To place this text, just click or click and drag to create a new text frame with the additional text. This new text frame is linked to the previous text frame. When linked, text flows freely between the two frames if you change the size of the frames or the formatting of the text (see Figure 2.33 (e)).




Figure 2. 34 A Text Frame

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2. 13. 5 Typing and Selecting Text

Before you can work with text in InDesign, you need to select it. You can select the entire text frame or the characters in the text frame. The selection tools (Selection and Direct Selection) allow you to select both characters and its object. You can use the type tools to select only the characters in the text frame, but not the object. When you add text to a text frame, pressing **Enter** key creates a new paragraph. If you want to force a line break, known as a soft return, instead of a new paragraph, you can press **Shift+Enter**.

2.13.6 Changing the Font and Font Size of the Text

You can change the font and font size of the text to enhance the appearance of your document using control palette. When the text is selected, the Control palette displays the character formatting controls.

Changing the Font of the Text

- 1. Select the text you want to change to a different font.
- 2. In the Control Palette, click on **Font** drop down list box to display a list of the available fonts.
- 3. Click on the font you want to use. The text you selected changes to the new font.
- 4. To deselect text, click on outside the selected area.

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


Figure 2.35 Character formatting controls

Changing the Font Size of the Text

- 1. Select the text you want to change the font size.
- **2.** In the Control Palette, click the down arrow of the Font size drop down box to display a list of the available Font sizes.
- **3.** Click on the font size you want to use.
 - The text you selected changes to the new size.
- **4.** To deselect text, click on outside the selected area.




Figure 3.36 Font size drop down box

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2.13.7 Changing the Text Bold, Italic or Bold Italic Style

You can make the text bold or italicize or bold italic to emphasize information in your document.

- 1. Select the text you want to change to bold, italic or bold italic.
- 2. In the Control Palette, click on the Font style drop down list box to display a list of the available fonts styles.
- 3. Click on the font style(Bold / Italic/ Bold Italic) you want to use. The text you selected changes to the new font style.
- 4. To deselect text, click on outside the selected area.





Figure 2. 37 Font style drop down list box

2.13.8 Changing the Colour of

Colour of the text can be changed to draw attention to headings or important information in your document.

- 1. Select the text you want to change the colour.
- 2. Click on Swatches icon to display the available colours.
 - If the Swatches icon is not displayed, choose Window > Colour > Swatches (or) press F5.
- 3. Click on any colour in the Swatches panel you want to apply.
 - The text appears in the colour you selected.





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


Figure 2. 38 Changing the Colour of the Text

2. 13. 9 Making Characters Superscript or Subscript

You can change the text in Superscript or Subscript from Control palette.

- 1. Select the character that you want to change Superscript or Subscript.
- **2.** Click on one of the buttons in the Control palette.

2.14 Formatting Paragraphs

Paragraphs are lines of text that are separated by the space created when you press **Enter** key. For example, if you type Monday, press Enter key, then type Tuesday, you have created two paragraphs—one on each line. Like text, you can format paragraphs by changing paragraph properties such as leading and alignment.

Leading (pronounced "LEDing") is the amount of space between the baselines of two lines of type.

Alignment refers to the way a paragraph is horizontally spread out between the left and right sides of a text box.

The following Table describes the available paragraph alignment buttons on the **Control panel** and the **Paragraph panel**.



	Type of alignment	Description
	Align left	Lines are aligned on the left border of a text box.
	Align center	Lines are centered between the left and right borders of a text box.
	Align right	Lines are aligned on the right border of a text box.
	Justify with last line aligned left	Lines are evenly distributed so that they align on both the right and left borders of a text frame. The last line in the paragraph is aligned on the left border.

Adding Bullets and Numbering 2.15

The best way to draw attention to a list is to format the items with bullets or numbers. Bullets are small symbols, such as circles or squares, that you can insert before the beginning of a paragraph. Bullets are typically used for an unsorted list of items. Use numbers instead of bullets for items that need to be in a specific order. If you move, insert, or delete items in a numbered list, InDesign sequentially renumbers the list for you.

Add Bullets or Numbering to a Paragraph

- 1. Select the paragraphs to which you want to add bullets or numbers.
- 2. Choose Type > Bulleted & Numbered Lists, and then click Apply Bullets or Apply Numbers.

The last used settings in the Bullets and Numbering dialog box are applied to the text.

2. 16 Working with Objects

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


Figure 2.42(b) Objects

Objects are text or graphic elements—images, blocks of color and even simple lines—that are placed in an InDesign document. All objects in InDesign are in frames. When you select an object's frame, its handles become highlighted, as shown in Figure 2.42.

When working with InDesign, there are many types of objects that you can add to

your document pages. Graphics such as photos and illustrations are one type; other types include shapes, lines, text boxes, Microsoft Excel charts, and Microsoft Word tables. You can modify objects in InDesign using many tools, panels, and menu commands. For example, you can scale an object, rotate an object, or add color to it. You can group it with other objects, or change its transparency or location on the page.

The yellow square handle on a frame is an extra handle that is used to create corner effects on frames.

2. 16. 1 Creating an Object

Sometimes the only type of object you need for your publication is a simple shape. Shapes can add visual interest to a document and serve as a background for text. The tools for creating shapes include the Rectangle, Ellipse, and Polygon tools. To select a shape tool, click and hold down the mouse button on the Rectangle tool (or currently selected shape tool) on the Tools panel, and then select the shape tool you want to use. With a shape tool selected, you can create a shape manually by dragging in the document, or you can click in the document to open the shape's dialog box and define its settings. You use the Swatches panel to add color to the fill and stroke (border) of your shape, and the Stroke panel to change the weight (thickness) and style of the stroke.


2. 16. 2 Creating Graphic Frame

Graphic frame can hold graphic content. You can distinguish a text frame from a normal graphic frame because the graphic frames display a non-printing 'X' in their centres.

Graphic frames are used to import pictures of other software programs.

In InDesign, all imported images are contained within graphic frames. The Tools panel contains three tools for drawing graphic frames.

- This tool lets you create 1. Ellipse Frame oval and round frames.
- 2. Rectangle Frame This tool lets you create rectangular and square frames.
- 3. Polygon Frame This tool lets you create equilateral polygons frames.



Ellipse Frame **Rectangle Frame Polygon Frame**





To create a Rectangle frame

- 1. Click on the Rectangle Frame tool in the Tools panel (or) Press **F** in the keyboard.
- 2. Position the Rectangle Frame tool pointer on the page.
- **3.** Drag to create a rectangle frame that is approximately the size and shape you want, then release the mouse button.

When you release the mouse button after creating a Rectangle frame, the frame you created is active. If the Selection tool was previously selected, the frame is displayed within its bounding box, which contains eight resizing handles, which help you to change the shape or size of the bounding box or the frame.




Figure 2. 43 Creating a Rectangle frame

2. 16. 3 Inserting Picture in Graphic Frame

Graphic frames are used to import pictures of other software programs. You can insert the picture in the frame.

- 1. Make a graphic frame.
- **2.** Choose **File > Place** in the menu.
 - The **Place** dialog box appears.
- 3. Locate and select the picture you want to insert the frame.
- 4. Click on Open.

The picture will appear in the graphic frame.

2. 16. 4 Transforming an Object

Transform is a term used to describe the act of moving an object, scaling it, skewing it, or rotating it. You can do all of the above in the Transform or Control panels.

When you transform something, you change its appearance. For example, you can rotate an object 45° or scale an object 50% to make it half its original size. The Transform commands in InDesign include Move, Scale, Rotate, Shear, and Flip. You can also transform objects using buttons on the Transform panel or the Control panel. You can change the width and height of an object and its location on the page. Before you transform an object, you choose a reference point from which to transform it. This point is called the point of origin, and it is the point of the selected object that remains fixed during the transformation.

Transformation Basics

There are many ways to transform an object in InDesign. Select the object using the Selection tool, then:

- Drag a selection handle to scale the object (but not necessarily the contents of that object).
- Select a transformation tool from the Tools panel, set the center of transformation (if necessary), and drag the tool.
- Display the Transform panel or Control panel and enter values in the

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


Figure 2. 45 Transforming an Object




Figure 2. 46 Rotating an Object

(

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panel field corresponding to the transformation you want to apply—or choose a preset value from the pop-up menu associated with that field.

- Choose one of the "preset" rotation or reflection options from the Transform panel menu or Control panel menu.
- Double-click one of the transformation tools in the Toolbox to display the corresponding transform dialog box (double-click the Rotate tool, for example, to display the Rotation dialog box).
- Select the Free Transform tool, and drag the tool around the object.
- Press keyboard shortcuts.

There's no "right" or "best" way to do transformations—you can experiment with the different methods and see which you like best. We change methods depending on the situation (and our mood).

Modifying Corners and Strokes

In InDesign, you can modify the corners of a rectangular shape using the Corner Options dialog box, which offers five types of corners, such as Rounded and Beveled. Like most dialog boxes, you can preview the settings applied to the selected object before closing the dialog box. To better see the changes made to corners, a thick stroke is recommended. You change the weight of a stroke on the Stroke panel.




Figure 2. 47 Object Menu











To modify the corner of a Rectangle

- 1. Draw a rectangle and select it.
- 2. Change the weight of the stroke in the Stroke panel.
- 3. Choose **Object** > **Corner Options** menu. **Corner options** dialog box appears.
- 4. Give suitable Corner Size and shape in it.




Figure 2. 48 Corner Options

2.17 Printing the Document

When you press Ctrl-P, InDesign displays the Print dialog box. There are so many features packed into this dialog box that Adobe had to break it up into eight different panes, each listed along the left side of the dialog box: General, Setup, Marks and Bleeds, Output, Graphics, Color Management, Advanced, and Summary.




Figure 2. 49 File Menu

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


Figure 2. 50 Print dialog box

Printers

Before you go anywhere in the Print dialog box, you've got to make one or two important decisions. First, you must choose from the options on the Printer pop-up menu, which lists the printers you have installed on your computer. When you choose a printer, InDesign looks to the printer driver to see what PPD (PostScript Printer Description) file is associated with that printer, and it displays it—grayed out—in the PPD pop-up menu. In the case of a non-PostScript device, InDesign leaves this pop-up menu blank.

General

The General pane of the Print dialog box contains basic printing features: which pages do you want to print, how many copies do you want, and how do you want them to come out of the printer (see Figure 2. 50).

Copies

Enter the number of copies of the page you want to print in the Copies field. You can print up to 9999 copies of your publication.

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Collate

When you turn on the Collate option, InDesign prints the range of pages you've specified, in order, for each copy of the publication you print. This makes for much slower printing. When you print multiple copies of a page, your printer only needs to process each page once (and then prints multiple copies of the page using the same image); when you turn on the Collate option, your printer must process each page once for every copy of the print job.

Reverse Order

When you print a multipage document, do you want the first page to come out first or last? Turning on the Reverse Order check box tells InDesign to print the last page first, then print "backwards" to the first page. You'll want to turn this on if your pages come out of the laser printer face up.

Page Ranges

Turn on the All Pages option to print all of the pages in the publication. To print a range of pages, turn on the Range option. Enter the page range in the Range field as shown in the following Table.

To print	Enter	Example
A continuous range of pages	first page - last page	12-21
Up to a specific page	- last page	-5
From a page to the end of the document	first page -	5-
Non-contiguous pages	page, page	1, 3
Mixed page ranges	page, range	-3, 6-9, 12, 15-

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Sequence

To print even and odd pages, select the All Pages option from the Sequence pop-up menu; to print even pages, select Even Pages Only; and to print odd pages select Odd Pages Only. These choices affect all page ranges, including page ranges you've entered in the Range field.

Print Master Pages

Sometimes you need to print your master pages instead of your document pages. No problem: Just turn on the Print Master Pages check box. When you do this, you cannot specify page ranges—InDesign prints all the master pages in the document.

Print Blank Pages

What happens when you print a three-page document that has nothing on page 2? By default, only pages 1 and 3 print out. If you want the blank page 2 to print, too, you'd better turn on the Print Blank Pages check box.

Print

Finally press the Print button to print the document

The Control panel has two buttons that allow you to switch between formatting characters and formatting paragraphs. The two buttons are at the far left side of the panel. The Letter "A" button is the Character Formatting Controls button. Click this button to display options for formatting characters, such as Font Size, Superscript, and All Caps, on the left side of the Control panel. The ¶ button is the Paragraph Formatting Controls button. Click this button to display options for formatting paragraphs, such as alignment and indentation, on the left side of the Control panel.





- An indent is a blank space between text and its margin or frame border.
- A drop cap is a design element in which the first letter or letters of a paragraph are increased in size to create a visual effect.
- A spread is a collection of pages designed to be viewed together. The simplest type of spread is a two-page spread, such as the one that you are viewing right now as you read this book.
- Continuous text that occupies one or more frames is called a story.
- Every piece of text in InDesign is inside a text frame. This frame is movable; that is, you can pick it up and move it anywhere you want. You can resize it, reshape it, rotate it, fill it with color, put a shadow on it, put it in front or behind other objects. You can break the text frame into many individual frames and connect them all together so the story flows continuously through the individual pieces.

POINTS TO REMEMBER

- InDesign is a page layout software program used to design and produce documents that can be printed or used on the Web.
- A workspace is where your work is created. Workspaces typically include an area designated for creating a finished product, much like a painter would use a canvas to create a painting.
- The default workspace in InDesign is called Essentials.
- Panels are small windows that contain options for working with selected objects.
- The document window is the central area that represents the open InDesign document.
- The pasteboard is the gray area surrounding the document window. You can place items on the pasteboard before actually inserting them on the page.
- The status bar is at the bottom of the workspace. The status bar gives you the status of what is going on at the moment.
- If you place the cursor over any tool in the Tools panel without clicking, a tooltip appears displaying the tool's name and a keyboard shortcut in parentheses.
- The Page tool is used for creating different page sizes within a document.
- Zooming allows you to quickly zoom in on, or get closer to, any object in your document.
- The view commands in InDesign are Zoom In, Zoom Out, Actual Size, Fit page in Window, Fit Spread in Window, Entire Pasteboard.

About CorelDRAW

CorelDraw is a versatile graphics application for creating high quality vector illustrations, logo designs, and page layouts.




Fig. 3.1 Corel DRAW 2018

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Understanding vector graphics and bitmaps

There are two main types of computer graphics. They are vector graphics and bitmaps.

Vector graphics

Vector graphics are made of lines and curves. They are generated from mathematical descriptions. These graphics are ideal for logos and illustrations. As they are resolution-independent graphics, they can be scaled to any size, or printed and displayed at any resolution, without losing detail and quality.

Bitmaps


Bitmaps are also known as **raster images**. They are composed of small squares called **pixels**. Each pixel is mapped to a location in an image and has numerical colour values.

As Bitmaps reproduce color gradations well, they are excellent for photographs and digital paintings.

Bitmaps are **resolution-dependent images** which means that they represent a fixed number of pixels. They look good at their actual size, but they appear jagged

or lose image quality when scaled, or when displayed or printed at a resolution higher than their original resolution.

By using CorelDRAW you can create vector graphics. You can also import bitmaps(raster images) such as JPEG and TIFF files into CorelDRAW and add them to your drawings.

If you enlarge a bitmap in your page layout package, you may lose resolution and it may appear jagged. If you shrink a bitmap in your page layout package, the result will look good.

CoreIDRAW Terms

Before getting started with CorelDRAW you should be familiar with the following terms.

Term	Description
Object	An object is an element in a drawing such as an image, shape, line,text, curve, symbol, or layer.
Drawing	Drawing is the work you create in CorelDRAW, for example, custom artwork, logos, posters, and newsletters.
Vector graphic	Vector graphic is an image generated from mathematical descriptions that determine the position, length, and direction in which lines are drawn.

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Bitmap	Bitmap is an image composed of grids of pixels or dots.		
Docker	Docker is a window that contains available commands and settings relevant to a specific tool or task.		
Flyout	Flyout is a button that opens a group of related tools or menu items.		
List box	List box is a list of options that drops down when a user clicks the down arrow button.

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






Flg. 3.5 Create a New Document dialog box




Fig. 3.9 Corel DRAW 2018 Document Window

9.	Rulers	There are two rulers in the window. They are horizontal ruler and vertical ruler. They are used to determine the size and position of objects in a document.
10.	Docker	A Docker window is so called because it is generally docked to all right edge of a main window. If you open two or more docker windows at a time these windows remain in a tabbed position and you can bring the desired window in front by clicking its tab.
11.	Document navigator	Document navigator is the area at the bottom left of the application window that contains controls for moving between pages and adding pages.
12.	Navigator	Navigator is a button at the lower-right corner of the application window that opens a smaller display to help you move around a drawing.
13.	Color palette	Color palette is a dockable bar. It contains color swatches. The tiny squares of colour you see in this palette are referred to as wells.
14.	Status bar	Status bar is the area at the bottom of the document window. It displays information about selected object properties such as type, size, colour, fill type and outline. The status bar also displays the current mouse position in the document window.

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


Fig. 3.10 Standard tool bar

Property bar

The property bar is next to Standard toolbar. It displays the most commonly used functions that are relevant to the active tool. Even though it looks like a toolbar, the property bar content changes depending on the tool or task.

For example, when you click the Text tool in the Toolbox, the Property bar shows only text-related commands like formatting, alignment, and editing tools.




Fig. 3.11 Property bar

When you click the Rectangle tool in the Toolbox, the Property Bar shows only rectangle related commands.

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


Fig.1.12 Property Bar for Rectangle

When you click the Ellipse tool in the Toolbox, the Property Bar shows only ellipsespecific options.




Fig.1.13 Property Bar for Ellipse Tool

Exploring the toolbox

The Toolbox is a component of the application window. It contains more tools for drawing and editing images. Some of the tools are visible, while others are grouped in flyouts. We can access the tools in a flyout by clicking the small flyout arrow in the lower-right corner of the toolbox button.




Fig.1.14 Flyout Menu and Flyout Arrow

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Exploring the Flyouts

The toolbox contains a range of tools that can be used for specific drawing and editing tasks. Some tools are used to draw shapes, and other tools are used to apply colors, patterns, or fills to objects. Some tools belong to flyouts. They are groups of related tools. A small arrow which is in the lower right corner of a toolbox button indicates that the tool belongs to a flyout. The last-used tool in the flyout appears on the button. We can access the tools in a flyout by clicking the flyout arrow.

The following table provides descriptions of the flyouts and tools in the CorelDRAW toolbox.


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


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2. DRAWING SHAPES


CorelDRAW has different shape tools that you use to create ellipse(including circles), rectangle (including squares), polygons, stars and some basic shapes.

Drawing rectangles and squares

Drawing a Rectangle

- 1. To draw a rectangle, select the Rectangle tool in the toolbox. The mouse pointer changed to a crosshair with a small rectangle beneath it.
- 2. Click and drag anywhere in the drawing area. As you drag, a rectangle appears.
- 3. Release the mouse button when the rectangle is of the desired size.
- **4.** Now a rectangle will appear on the screen.


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Rectangle Tool Cursor




Fig.3.16 Rectangle

As you click and drag using the cursor, you'll also notice that the Status bar and Property bar show coordinates, width, and height properties detailing your new object's shape.

Drawing a Square

1. To draw a square, select the Rectangle tool in the toolbox. The mouse pointer changes to a crosshair with a small rectangle beneath it.

- 2. Click on anywhere in the drawing area and hold down the **Ctrl** key while dragging the mouse pointer.
- **3.** Release the mouse button where you like the end of the square.




Fig.2.17 A Square

Creating a Rounded Rectangle

After drawing a rectangle, you can optionally round its corners. You can round all corners at once or choose the ones you want to round. Corners can be slightly rounded to create a softening effect or very rounded, almost changing the rectangle into a circle.

To round the corners of a rectangle:

- 1. In the toolbox, select the **Shape Tool** icon from the Shape Tool layout or press **F10** key.
- 2. Select the rectangle you wish to round. Four black nodes appear around the rectangle.




Fig.3.18 (c) Creating a Rounded Rectangle

- 3. To set the same rounding for all corners make sure that all nodes are selected (black) and then drag any node. See Figures 3.18(a)-3.18(c)





Creating ellipses

- 1. To draw an ellipse (also known as an oval), select the Ellipse tool in the toolbox. The mouse pointer changes to a crosshair with a small ellipse beneath it.
- 2. Click on anywhere in the drawing area and drag the mouse pointer.
- 3. Release the mouse button where you like the end of the ellipse.




Fig.3.19 An Ellipse



Creating Circles

- 1. To draw a circle, select the Ellipse tool in the toolbox. The mouse pointer changes to a crosshair with a small ellipse beneath it.
- 2. Click on anywhere in the drawing area and hold down the Ctrl key while dragging the mouse pointer.
- 3. Release the mouse button where you like the end of the circle.





Fig.3.20 A Circle

Creating Polygons

- 1. To draw a polygon (also known as pentagon: a five-sided figure), select the **Polygon tool** in the toolbox. The mouse pointer changes to a crosshair with a small polygon beneath it.
- 2. Click on anywhere in the drawing area and drag the mouse pointer.
- 3. Release the mouse button where you like the end of the polygon.
- 4. To increase the number of sides of your polygon, select the polygon you have drawn using the Pick tool.


5. Place the mouse pointer on the Number of Points on Polygon text box and type the number of sides you like for you polygon.

You can also set the number of sides for your polygon and then draw it.

Creating Stars

Polygon tool has a small arrow in the lower-right corner of the tool. That little arrow indicates that this tool has a flyout.

To draw a star,

1. Click on the Polygon tool and hold down the mouse key. A flyout menu will appear showing you other tools.













- 2. Click on the Star tool from the flyout menu.
- **3.** Click on anywhere in the drawing area and drag the mouse pointer.
- **4.** Release the mouse button where you would like the end of the star.

Drawing Spirals

There are two types of spirals. They are

- 1. Symmetrical spiral
- 2. Logarithmic spiral.

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A Symmetrical spiral expands evenly so that the distance between each revolution is equal. A Logarithmic spiral expands with increasingly larger distances between revolutions.


You can draw spirals of different sizes with Spiral tool.

To draw a spiral,

- **1.** Click and hold the **Polygon tool**. A flyout menu will appear.
- **2.** Click on the **Spiral tool** from the flyout menu.
- 3. Now you should type a value in the Spiral revolutions box on the property bar to set the number of full-circle revolutions to appear in the new spiral object.
- **4.** Next, click one of the following buttons on the property bar:
 - Symmetrical spiral
 - Logarithmic spiral

If you want to change the amount by which the spiral expands as it moves outward, move the Spiral expansion slide.

5. Drag diagonally in the drawing window until the spiral is the required size.




Fig 3.26 Symmetrical spiral and Logarithmic spiral

The objects you can create may have between 1 to 100 revolution, each of which is equal to one complete rotation around its center point. The direction of the revolutions is set according to the click and drag action during creation of the initial shape, as shown below.




Fig. 3.27 The direction of your spiral revolution is determined by your click - drag direction.

Drawing Grids

Using Graph Paper tool, you can draw a grid and set the number of rows and columns. A grid is a grouped set of rectangles that you can break apart.

To draw a grid,

- 1. Click and hold the Polygon tool. A flyout menu will appear.
- 2. Select the Graph Paper tool from the flyout menu.
- 3. Now type values in the top and bottom portions of the Columns and rows box on the property bar.
 - The value you type in the top portion of the Columns and rows box specifies the number of columns; the value you type in the bottom portion specifies the number of rows.
- 4. Click on anywhere in the drawing area where you want the grid to appear.
- 5. Drag diagonally to draw the required grid.

If you want to draw the grid from its center point outward, hold down **Shift** key as you drag; if you want to draw a grid with square cells, hold down Ctrl key as you drag.

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



Fig. 3.29 Drawing a Grid

Drawing in Freehand mode

Drawing a straight line

To draw a straight line

- **1.** Click the **Freehand tool** (or) press F5 in the keyboard.
- 2. Move the cursor to where you want the line to start and click once.
- **3.** Move the cursor towards the position for the endpoint.
 - You will notice a "**rubberband**" line, which follows your cursor.
- **4.** Release the mouse button where you like to end the line. The line will be drawn.






Fig. 3.30 A Rubber band Line

- 5. If you want to draw a second straight line connected to the first, continue with Freehand tool, and click again on the endpoint of the last segment.
- 6. Move the cursor to draw the second segment. Click once when you have the desired second segment positioned correctly. Repeat steps 5 and 6 to draw as many segments as require.

Remember that you must click at two points - the beginning and end of the segment.








Fig. 3.31 Segments

Adding arrowheads to lines

To add arrowhead to a line

- 1. Using the Freehand tool draw a line.
- 2. Select the line.
- 3. Click the drop-down button on the End Arrowhead Selector on the Property tool bar.
- 4. Then click the desired arrow tip. Now the line appears with an arrow.

You can set the line style, width, and the colour of the line using the Properties bar.




Fig. 3.32 Adding an Arrow head to a line

3. Using the Color Palette

The Color Palette is a characteristic component of CorelDRAW. It can be used docked or undocked.

Viewing Palette Colors

- The tiny squares of colour you see in this palette are referred to as wells.
- To scroll the Color Palette color well collection, click the Up or Down arrow buttons at the top and bottom of the palette.
- Single clicks using your left mouse **button** on these arrow buttons enables you to scroll the section, one colour well at a time.
- Single clicks with your right mouse button produce a Page Up and Page Down effect, scrolling the visible color selection a complete row up or down.
- You can rearrange the order of any collection of colours in the Color Palette by click-dragging up or down on any colour well.
- Scrolling provides a way for you to gain access to a limited selection of visible colors. But, when this isn't convenient, you can view the full collection temporarily by clicking the Expand button.
- After making your colour selection, Color Palette automatically returns to its original state.
- While the Color Palette is floating, click-drag its title bar to move it around the window or click the Close **button** to hide it from view.
- Choose Window > Color Palettes and select a palette to display any palette in its last used state.

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


Fig. 3.33 Color Palette




Fig. 3.34 Close button to hide color palette




Fig. 3.35 Expanding colour selection

Changing Palette Options

The Options flyout button on the Color Palette features several important commands, enabling you to apply fill and outline colors (as opposed to using left and right mouse button clicks to apply colours to objects) or control how the palette itself is viewed.

You can use Edit commands to change a palette colours, open the Palette Editor, or locate a specific colour. You may also view colors by name only by choosing the Show Color Names option.



Color palette options flyout arrow




Fig. 3.36 Changing Palette Options

Selecting Fill and Outline Colours

To fill colour to any object:

- **1.** Select the object using the Pick tool.
- 2. Click on any colour on the Color palette.
- 3. The selected colour will be applied to the object.
- 4. Right click on any colour on the Color palette.
- 5. The outline colour of the selected object will change to the selected colour.




Fig. 3.37 Filling colour to an object

Resizing shapes of objects

Resizing shape means changing the size of the shape by making it larger or smaller than the original one. You can resize shape objects by dragging the handles. When you drag a handle in towards the centre of the object, you make it smaller. When you drag out, away from the centre, you make the object larger.

- 1. Select the object to be resized. The handles appear around the object. Place your mouse pointer over the handle.
- 2. Click and drag the handle to resize the shape of the object.

If you drag a corner handle, you maintain the proportion between height and width as you resize your object. But if you drag from a side or top handle, you will change not only the size but also the shape of the object.




Fig. 3.38 Resizing shapes of objects

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5. Rotating Objects

Rotating an object turns it clockwise or counterclockwise at the angle you specify.

You can rotate objects by dragging them or by entering values in the Angle of rotation box.

To rotate an object using the mouse

- 1. Select the object using the Pick tool.
- 2. Click on the object again. The handles will change from small black squares to curved arrows.
- **3.** Click and drag the rotation handles in clockwise or counterclockwise direction to rotate the selected object.
- **4.** Release the mouse button and the object will be rotated.




Fig. 3.39 Rotating an object using the mouse

To rotate an object using Angle of rotation box

- 1. Select the object using the Pick tool.
- **2.** Placing the mouse pointer on the Angle of rotation box in the Property bar and click on it.
- 3. Enter the rotation angle in the Angle of rotation text box, by which you would like to rotate the object.




Fig. 3.40 Rotating an object using Angle of Rotation text box

6. Undoing and Redoing

CorelDRAW remembers previous actions you performed during the current session. You can undo the actions that you perform in a drawing, starting with the most recent action. If you don't like the result of undoing an action, you can redo it. Reverting to the last saved version of a drawing also lets you remove one or more actions. Certain actions applied to objects, such as stretching, filling, moving, and rotating, can be repeated to create a stronger visual effect.

Customizing the Undo settings lets you increase or decrease the number of actions that you can undo or redo.

To undo, redo, and repeat actions

То	Do the following
Undo an action	Choose Edit > Undo [Last Action]
Redo an action	Choose Edit > Redo
Revert to the last saved version of a drawing	Choose File > Revert
Repeat an action	Choose Edit > Repeat

To specify the Undo settings

- 1. Choose Tools > Options in the menu bar.
- **2.** In the Workspace list of categories, click General.
- **3.** In the Undo levels area, type a value in one or both of the following boxes:
 - Regular specifies the number of actions that can be reversed









- when you use the Undo command with vector objects
- Bitmap effects specifies the number of actions that can be reversed when you work with bitmap effects

The value that you specify is limited only by your computer's memory resources. The higher the value you specify, the greater the demand on memory resources.




Fig. 3.41 Options in the Tools Menu




Fig. 3.42 Options dialog box




Fig. 3.43 Specifying the number of Undo levels

Undo levels here.

Actions you cannot undo are:

- Change of view (zooming, scrolling, etc.)
- File operation (open, saving, importing, etc.)
- Object selection operation

The **Undo** command changes depending on the last action - for example, "Undo Fill" or "Undo Rotate". If the action cannot be undone, or there are no actions to be undone, the command is grayed.

Immediately after using Undo, the Redo command becomes available, allowing you to restore what you just undid.

7. Saving a Drawing

To save a drawing

- 1. Choose **File > Save** in the menu bar.
- 2. Save Drawing dialog appears.
- **3.** In the Save Drawing dialog box,
- Type a filename in the **File name** list
- Locate the folder where you want to save the file.

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- •
- If you want the drawing to be compatible with a previous version of CorelDRAW, choose a version from the Version list box.
- If you want to save the drawing to a vector file format other than CorelDRAW(CDR), choose a file format from the **Save as type**.




Fig. 3.45 Save Drawing dialog box

7.1 Saving an existing Drawing

You can save an existing document simply by clicking the **Save** button in the Standard Toolbar or by choosing **File** > **Save** (**Ctrl** + **S**), which causes your most recent changes to be saved immediately without opening any dialogs.

8. Closing Document Files

To close a document, you can use one of these actions:

- 1. Click the **Close** button in the upper right corner of your document window. (or)
- Choose File > Close or Window > Close Window or Press Ctrl + F4.
- If you have more than one document file open, choosing Window > Close
 All closes all files at once.

Whichever method you use to close your documents, you'll be prompted to choose whether or not to save any recent changes you've made.

When closing multiple files, CorelDRAW prompts you for saving changes to each changed document.




Fig. 3.47 Save changes to dialog box




Fig. 3.48 Close All Option in the Window Menu




Fig. 3.49 Close Window Option in the Window Menu

Exiting CorelDRAW

Choosing Exit from the File menu ends the current CorelDRAW session. If you have made any changes since you last saved your file. CorelDRAW prompts you to save the file before exiting. Click Yes to save the changes.

Shortcut:

Pressing **Alt** + **F4** exits CorelDRAW.

10. Working with Objects

Selecting Objects

The drawings you made with tools are objects. To select any object, place your mouse pointer on that object and click on it.

Sometimes when your Drawing window gets crowded with objects, it can be hard to select an object using the Pick tool. So at that time you can select object using the keyboard's **Tab** key.

Selecting objects with the Tab key

To select objects using the Tab key:

- 1. First create at least three objects (there can be as many objects as you like) using the Rectangle tool.
- 2. Press the **spacebar** to select the Pick tool.
- **3.** Then press **Tab** key until a selection box appears around the object you want to select. When you press Tab key, it selects an object, starting with the first object created and moving towards the last object.

If you press **Shift** + **Tab**, it selects an object, starting with the first object created and moving towards the last object created.

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




Selecting multiple objects

With the Pick tool, you can select more objects at a time. You can select multiple objects with the Pick tool in two ways:

- 1. Hold down the **Shift key**, and click on each object that you want to select.
 - You can select as many objects as you have in your Drawing window in this way.
 - You can even deselect objects that have been selected by holding down the **Shift Key** and clicking on them.
- 2. You can also select more objects than one at a time by using the Pick tool to draw a marquee (rectangle) around the objects. Only those objects that are completely encompassed by the marquee that you draw with the Pick tool will be selected.





Deselecting Objects

Deselecting a single object

To deselect an object,

- Click anywhere that is not an outline or high lighting box / marker. In other words, click any white space. (or)
- Press the Esc key.
 The highlighting box disappears, indicating that no objects are selected.

Deselecting multiple objects

To deselect multiple objects, click any white space. All selected objects become deselected.









Deselecting a single object in a group

To deselect a single object among multiple selected objects, hold down **Shift key** and click the object.

Moving Objects

You can move objects by dragging them with the mouse, by nudging them with the arrow keys on your keyboard.

Moving objects using mouse.

To move an object using the mouse

- 1. Select the object using the Pick tool.
- 2. Depress the mouse while pointing to a spot on the object's outline, or within a filled area of an object. A dotted highlighting box appears.
- **3.** Drag it to the desired location.
- **4.** Release the mouse when the object is positioned correctly.

Moving objects in increments by nudging

The cursor keys on your keyboard allow you to move or nudge selected objects in the direction indicated by the arrow on the key.

Nudge: The act of moving a selection incrementally using the keyboard arrow keys.

Copying Objects

Objects can be copied using the **Duplicate** and **Clone** commands in the Edit menu. You can also use the Windows Clipboard.

Copying

CorelDraw provides several ways to create copies of selected objects.

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1. Using the Right click

Click your right mouse button while transforming, rotating, or moving an object with the Pick tool to create a copy on the fly. The object currently being dragged becomes the copy, leaving the original object unchanged. The small + symbol beside the cursor indicates that a copy has been created.

Note: Using the right-click technique to copy an object as you transform it applies only while using the Pick tool.





Fig. 3.53 Copying an Object Using the Right click

2. Using the SPACEBAR

Press the SPACEBAR while transforming, rotating, or moving an object with the Pick tool to create a copy. Doing this causes a copy to be created in situ, meaning a copy is 'dropped' each time the SPACEBAR is pressed.



Pressing and holding the SPACEBAR causes your key-repeat action to create multiple copies so as long as the SPACEBAR is held, which in turn creates multiple copies in quick succession.



Each time the SPACEBAR is pressed, a copy is "dropped".

3. Pressing Numeric + Key

Pressing the + key on your numeric keypad creates a copy of the selected object in exactly the same position as (and arranged in front of) the original.

After pressing the + key, the copy becomes the selected object. You may create as many copies as you want using this method, but be aware that each additional copy will hide the original (or the copy) behind it.

Duplication objects

To create a copy of a selected object,

Choose **Edit** > **Duplicate** from the menu bar (or) press **Ctrl** + **D** in the keyboard.

The copy will be offset slightly to the upper right of the original and placed on top as shown below. The new copy is automatically selected.




Fig. 3.55 Duplicate option in the Edit Menu




Fig. 3.56 Duplication of an Object





Cloning Objects

To create a clone of a selected object, Choose **Edit** > **Clone** from the menu bar.

The clone will be offset slightly to the upper right of the original and placed on top as shown below. The new copy is automatically selected.

Cloning differs from duplication in that most changes made to the original object(the "master") are automatically applied to the clone.

For example, if you change the original's fill, the clone's fill changes as well.




Fig. 3.57 Clone option in the Edit menu

Deleting Objects

To delete an object,

- 1. Select the object.
- **2.** Choose **Edit** > **Delete** in the menu bar (or) press the **Del** / **Delete** Key in the keyboard.

To retrieve a deleted object, you must use the Undo command or press **Ctrl** + **Z**.

Grouping and Ungrouping objects

When you group two or more objects using Group Objects command, they are treated as a single unit.

A group behaves as if it were a single unit, meaning any changes made to a group affects all objects in the group.

You can break a grouped object into its component objects by ungrouping it. This is useful when you need to make changes to some of the individual objects that comprise a grouped object.

To create a group object

- 1. Select the objects with the Pick tool. (To select multiple objects hold down Shift key while selecting them.)
- 2. Choose **Object** > **Group** > **Group** Objects (or) Press **Ctrl** + **G**. The selected objects will be grouped as a single object.





Fig. 3.58 Group objects option in the Object menu







Ungrouping

Ungrouping a group breaks the relationship among the objects.

To ungroup a group object

- 1. Select the grouped object using the Pick tool.
- 2. Choose **Object** > **Group** > **Ungroup** Objects on the menu Bar. (or) Press **Ctrl** + **U** in the key board (or) Click on the Ungroup Objects button on the Property Bar.

The grouped object will break into its component objects.




Fig. 3.59 Ungrouping objects

Since any selection of objects can be grouped, you can easily make groups of groups. Groups within groups are called "nested" groups.

To ungroup a nested groups

1. Select the nested groups using the Pick tool.

2. Choose **Object** > **Group** > **Ungroup** All Objects on the menu Bar. (or) Click on the Ungroup All Objects button on the Property Bar.

Tips

Ungroup Objects - breaks a group into individual objects, or a nested group into multiple groups.

Ungroup All objects - breaks a group into individual objects, including objects within nested groups.

Combining Objects

You can combine two or more objects using Combine command.

Combine command combines two or more objects and creates a single object with common fill and outline attributes.

Combining objects is different from grouping them. Combining objects actually transforms the objects that are combined. Combined objects can be broken apart. However, the objects do not revert to their original shape and fill but retain changes made when they were combined.


To Combine objects:

- 1. Select the objects with the Pick tool. (To select multiple objects hold down **Shift key** while selecting them.)
- 2. Choose Object > Combine (or) Press Ctrl + L. The selected objects will be grouped as a single object.












Fig. 3.60 The two objects (left) are combined to create a single object (right). The new object has the properties of the last object selected before combining.

To break apart a combined object

1. Select a combined object with the Pick tool.

2. Choose Object > Break Curve Apart (or) Press Ctrl + K. The combined object will break apart into component objects.





Fig. 3.61 Break Curve Apart option in the Object in the Object Menu

Welding objects

By welding you can create irregular shapes. The welded objects take on the outline and fill of the object that was selected last. Welded objects can revert to their original individual objects only by using the Undo button.

To weld objects using Property Bar

- 1. Select the objects with the Pick tool by holding the **Shift** key.
- 2. Choose Object > Shaping > Weld in the menu bar (or) Click on Weld **button** on the Property bar.
- 3. The objects will be welded and will become a single outline object.

If the marquee selected the objects when welding using the Property Bar, the welded object assumes the outline and the fill properties of the bottom-most selected object. If you use multiple selection, the welded object takes on the properties of the object you selected last.




Fig. 3.63 Weld option in the object Menu




Fig. 3.64 The welded object takes on the properties of the object you selected last.

11. Working with Text

CorelDRAW defines text in two ways: Artistic text and Paragraph text. You can enter text directly on the document page or through a text box. Paragraph text is better suited for long blocks of text whereas Artistic text offers you more freedom to assign artistic effects to letters.

Adding Artistic text

Artistic Text is used to create short pieces of text anywhere on the page. You can apply special effects and transformations to that text. If you are creating special effects with the text (for example, fitting it to a path, or blending and extruding it), you must enter it as Artistic text.

To add the Artistic text

1. Click the Text tool. The mouse pointer changes to a crosshair with a small 'A' beneath it.

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- 2. Position the cursor where you want the text to appear in your drawing and click. A vertical bar, called the "insertion point" appears.
- **3.** Type the text.
- 4. When finished, click the Pick tool. When you click on the Pick tool, your new text will be surrounded with eight small square black handles.




Fig. 3.65 Adding Artistic Text in the Document Page

Adding Paragraph text

Paragraph text is designed for adding lengthy blocks of text to ads, brochures and other types of text-intensive applications. Compared with Artistic text, Paragraph text offers more formatting options. For example, you can flow Paragraph text into columns, create bullet lists and set tabs and indents.

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To add Paragraph text, you must first create a frame to contain it. Once text is placed in the frame, you can move the entire block by dragging the outline of the frame or any of the text inside it with the Pick tool.

Dragging the Paragraph text frame's solid handles resizes the frame, but not the text inside it. To add the Paragraph text

- 1. Click the Text tool. The mouse pointer changes to a crosshair with a small 'A' beneath it.
- 2. Drag the mouse-cursor on the page diagonally to draw a text box (when you release the left button of the mouse, a text box appears on the screen with the keyboard-cursor blinking in it).
- **3.** Then type the text in the text box. When finished, click the Pick tool.





Fig. 3.66 Adding Paragraph text in the Document Page




Fitting text to a path

CorelDRAW allows you fit a string of text to any path - a straight or curved line, a rectangle, an ellipse, or another letter or text string. To fit text to a path, use the Fit Text to Path command in the Text menu. It becomes available only when you select both a text object and a non-text object at the same time.

A text string can be fitted to the "path" traced by the second object's outline, as shown in the following examples:







To fit text to a path:

- 1. Select the text object and the second object using the Pick tool and the Shift key.
- 2. Choose Fit Text To Path from the Text menu.
- **3.** The text is redrawn along the path of the second object.

You can remove the path object with the Delete command when the text is positioned correctly.

To remove the path object

- 1. Select the Shape tool and click on the path object.
- 2. Then Select the Pick tool and click on the path object.
- 3. Now press the **Delete** key. The path object is deleted.

Tips

To fit text to another letter, you must first convert the target letter to a curve object, using the Covert to Curves command in the **Object** menu.

Entering Text Directly onto a Path

Text can be entered directly onto most paths - curves, rectangles, ellipses, shapes, and stars.

To enter text directly onto a path

- 1. Using the Pick tool, select the path.
- 2. Choose **Text** > **Fit** text to path in the menu bar.
- 3. Move the text cursor over the outline of the target shape. The pointer changes to the Fit text to path pointer.







- 4. Click on it.
- 5. Type along the path.




Fig. 3.67 Fit text to path pointer




Fig. 3.68 Typing text along the path

12. PAGE SETUP

Each document page has its own set of page properties. Default document size will be single, letter-sized, and portrait-oriented page. If you want to change the default size of the document, you will change any of these properties.

12.1 Changing Page Size

The very simple way to define your page size is to click on a blank part of the Drawing area. When you do so, the Page Layout Property bar becomes active. You can use this Property bar to define the size and orientation of your page, as well as many other attributes.

To change the Page Size

- 1. Click anywhere on the drawing area except the object.
- 2. Click on the down arrow on the Page Size list box on the Property Bar. A drop down list of several page sizes will appear.
- 3. Click on the page size which you like to apply to your document. The page size you have chosen will be applied to your document.

Using the Page dimensions spin boxes

You can also define custom page sizes using the Page dimensions spin boxes in the Property bar.

- 1. Click anywhere on the drawing area except the object.
- 2. Type the width and the height that you like to have for your document in the Page dimensions spin boxes.
- 3. The page size for the drawing will be set according to the width and height you specified.

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


Fig. 3.69 Changing the page size




Fig. 3.70 Changing the page size using page dimensions spin boxes

12. 2 **INSERTING PAGES**

You can add, rename and delete pages in your document. If you have a document with three or more pages, you can delete a range of pages.

Inserting a page

- 1. Click on Layout in the menu bar. The Layout menu will appear.
- 2. Click on **Insert page**. The Insert Page dialog box will appear.

- 3. Type the number of pages you want to add to the Insert Page dialog box.
- 4. Click on Before or After to specify where you want to add the page relative to the active page.
- 5. In multi-page documents, type a new page number in the Existing Page Box to change the rel- ative page.
- **6.** Click on OK button. The page will be inserted in your document.




Fig. 3.71 Insert page option in the Layout Menu




Fig. 3.72 Insert page dialog box

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Renaming a Page

There may be a number of pages in your document and each page is assigned a name by default such as Page 1, Page 2, etc. You can see Page 1 is the page name beside the horizontal scroll bar. This page name has no concern whatsoever with the file name or document name with which you saved your work. You can change these page names to a more meaningful name.

To Rename a Page

- 1. Click on Layout. The layout menu will appear.
- 2. Click on Rename Page. Rename Page dialog box will appear.
- 3. Type the name of the page in the Page name box.
- 4. Click on OK button. The name of the page will be changed.




Fig 3.73 Rename page in the Layout Menu




Fig 3.74 Rename page dialog box









Fig. 3.77 Delete page dialog box

Introduction to Multimedia

Multimedia allows the users to combine and change data from various sources like image, text, graphics, video, audio and video to a single platform. Multimedia has become the latest enriching experience in the field of information sector. The fast growing of multimedia technology over the last decade has brought a lot of changes to computing, entertainment and education.

phenomenal growth multimedia technologies and applications has presented the computerized field with great challenges and opportunities. Multimedia is becoming more popular among the user in the terms of its uses and applications. Multimedia application plays vital role in terms of presenting information to the users.

Multimedia Definition

The word multimedia consists of two words "multi" and "media" which means that multiple forms of media are combined to gather and provide services like storage,

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communication, presentation and Input/ output interactions of text, video, image, graphics and audio.

The term multimedia comprises of two words, "multi" and "medium". Multi refers to many i.e. at least two. Media is the plural of medium. Therefore multimedia is an integration of many types of media like text, graphics, images, audio, animation, video etc on a single medium in the same information unit.

4.3 Components of Multimedia

Multimedia has five major components like text, images, sound, video and animation. They are explained in detail below:

4.3.1 Text

Text is the basic components of multimedia and most common ways of communicating information to other person. Even though multimedia includes images, video, audio and graphics, Text is the basic components used in multimedia.

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Static Text

Static text, the text or the words will remain static as a heading or in a line, or in a paragraph. The words are given along with the images to explain about the images. In static text the words will either give information or support an image or an video.




Figure 4.4 Static Text

Hypertext

A hypertext is a system which consists of nodes, the text and the links between the nodes, which defines the paths the user need to follow for the text access in non-sequential ways. The author of the working system created this structure. The user is permitted to define their own paths in more sophisticated hypertext systems. The user is provided with the flexibility and choice to navigate in hypertext. In a multimedia product Text is used to convey the information and must be placed at appropriate position in order to obtain the well-formatted sentences and paragraphs. The readability of the text depends on the spacing and punctuation. The message communication is more appropriate with improved Fonts and styles.

4.3.2 **Image**

Images acts as an vital component in multimedia. These images are generated by the computer in two ways, as bitmap or raster images and as vector images.

Raster or Bitmap Images

The common and comprehensive form of storing images in a computer is raster or bitmap image. Bitmap is a simple matrix of the tiny dots called pixel that forms a raster or bitmap image. Each pixel consists of two or more colors. Based on how much data, in bits is used to determine the number of colors, the color depth is determined. Eg. one bit is two colors, four bits means sixteen colors, eight bits indicates 256 colors, and so on.

Vector Images

Drawing elements or objects such as lines, rectangles, circles and so on to create an images are based on Vector images. The advantage of vector image is relatively small amount of data is required to represent the image and thereby only less memory is needed to store. Compression techniques are used to reduce the file size of images that is useful for storing large number of images and speeding transmission for networked application. various Compression formats used for this purpose are GIF, TIFF and JPEG.

4.3.3 Animation

Animation is the process displaying still images so quickly so that they give the impression of continuous movement. In animation the screen object is a vector image in animation. Using numerical transformations the movement of that image along its paths is calculated for their defining coordinates. The least frame rate of at least 16 frames per second gives the impression of smoothness and for natural looking it should be at least 25 frames per second. Animations may be in two or three dimensional. The two dimensional animation, bring an image alive, that occur

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on the flat X and Y axis of the screen. while in three dimensional animation it occurs along the three axis X, Y and Z. Animation tools are very powerful and effective. The two basic types of animations are Path animation and Frame animation.

Path Animation

Path animation involves moving an object on a screen that has a constant background e.g. a cartoon character may move across the screen regardless of any change in the background or the character.

Frame Animation

In frame animations, multiple objects are allowed to travel simultaneously and the background or the objects also changes.

4.3.4 **Sound**

Sound is a meaningful speech in any language and is the most serious element in multimedia, providing the pleasure of music, special effects and so on. Decibels is the measurement of volume, the pressure level of sound.

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Musical Instrument Digital Identifier (MIDI)

Musical Instrument Digital Identifier (MIDI) is a standard communication tool developed for computers and electronic instruments. This tool is flexible and easy for composing the projects in multimedia. Tools for synthesizing the sound and software for sequencing are necessary for MIDI.

Digital Audio

Sampled sound is a Digitized sound. A sample of sound is taken and stored every nth fraction of a second as digital information in bits and bytes. The quality of this recording depends on the sampling rate. sampling rate is defined as how often the samples are taken and how many numbers are used to represent the value of each sample (bit depth, resolution and sample size). The finer the quality of the captured sound and the resolution is achieved while played back, when more often the sample is taken and the more data is stored about that sample.

4.3.5 Video

Video is defined as the display of recorded event, scene etc. The powerful way to convey information in multimedia applications are embedding of video. The video can be categorized in two types as Analog video and Digital video.

Analog Video

In Analog video, the video data's are stored in any non-computer media like video tape, laserdisc, film etc. It is divided further in two types as Composite and Component Analogue Video. Composite Analog Video has all the video components







like brightness, color, and synchronization combined into one signal. Due to the combining of the video components, the quality of the composite video resulted in color blending, low clarity and high generational loss. This recording format was used for customer analog video recording tape formats such as Betamax and VHS.

4.4

File Formats for Multimedia

The following is an outline of current file formats used for the production and delivery of multimedia data.

4.4.1 Text Formats

RTF

Rich Text Format is the primary file format introduced in 1987 by Microsoft with the specification of their published products cross-platform for documents interchange.

Plain text

Plain text files can be opened, read, and edited with most text editors. commonly used are Notepad (Windows), Gedit or nano (Unix, Linux), TextEdit (Mac OS X) and so on. Other computer programs are also capable of reading and importing plain text. Plain text is the original and popular way of conveying an e-mail.

4.4.2 Image Formats

TIFF (Tagged Image File Format)

This format is common in desktop publishing world (high quality output), and is supported by almost all software packages. Recent versions of TIFF allows image compression, and the format is comfortable for moving large files between computers.

BMP (Bitmap)

Initially this format is in use with Windows 3.1. It is quite large and uncompressed and hence BMP is used for the high-resolution or large images.

DIB (Device Independent Bitmap)

This format which is similar to BMP, allows the files to be displayed on a variety of devices.

GIF (Graphics Interchange Format)

GIF is a compressed image format. Most of the computer color images and backgrounds are GIF files. This file format is best suitable for graphics that uses only limited colors, and it is the most popular format used for online color photos. 13-bit Color look up table is used by the GIF format to identify its color values. This format is supported widely.

JPEG (Joint Photographic **Experts Group)**

JPEG was designed to attain maximum compression. image It uses lossy compression technique, where compression method is referred that loses some of the data required for the image reconstruction. It works good with photographs, naturalistic artwork, and similar material but functions less on lettering, live drawings or simple cartoons.

TGA (Tagra)

It is the first popular format for highresolution images. TGA is supported by Most of the video-capture boards.

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PNG (Portable Network Graphics)

An extensible file format for the less loss, portable and well compressed storage of raster images. PNG acts as replacement for GIF and also replaces multiple common uses of TIFF. PNG works good with online viewing applications like worldwide web. so it is fully streameable with a best display option.




Figure 4.9 Image file Formats

4.4.3 Digital Audio File Formats

WAV (Waveform Audio File Format)

It is the most popular audio file format in windows for storing uncompressed sound files. In order to attain the reduced file size it can also be converted to other file formats like MP3.

MP3 (MPEG Layer-3 Format)

MPEG Layer-3 format is the most popular format for storing and downloading music. The MP3 files are roughly compressed to one-tenth the size of an equivalent WAV file.

OGG

A free, open source container format that is designed for obtaining better streaming and evolving at high end quality digital multimedia. It can be compared to MP3 files in terms of quality.

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AIFF (Audio Interchange File Format)

A standard audio file format used by Apple which is like a WAV file for the Mac.

WMA (Windows Media Audio)

It is a popular windows media audio format owned by Microsoft and designed with Digital Right Management (DRM) abilities for copyright protection.

RA (Real Audio Format)

Real Audio format is designed for streaming audio over the Internet. The digital audio resources are usually stored as a computer file in computer's hard drive or CD/DVD. Besides the variety of audio file formats available, the most common formats are wave files (.WAV) and MPEG Layer-3 files (.MP3), WMA and RA.

4.4.4 Digital Video File Formats

AVI (Audio/Video Interleave)

AVI is the video file format for Windows. Here sound and picture elements are stored in alternate interleaved chunks in the file.

MPEG (Moving Picture Experts Group)

MPEG is a standard for generating digital video and audio compression under the





International Standards Organization (ISO) by the group of people. The group has developed MPEG-1, the standard on which Video CD and MP3 are based, MPEG-2, the standard that supports products as Digital Television set top boxes and DVD, MPEG-4, the standard for multimedia and mobile web.MPEG-7, the standard for search of audio and visual content. Research on MPEG-21 "Multimedia Framework" has started in 2000. Simply MPEG is the standards for digital video and audio compression.

4.5 Multimedia Production

4.5.1 Steps in Multimedia **Production**

Adequate time and efficient planning is required for multimedia production, which assures that the project will be proceed smoothly and certainly ensures that the information reaches the target audience. Following are the phases for development of complex multimedia projects.

1. Conceptual Analysis and Planning

The process of multimedia making begins with a conceptual ignition point. Conceptual analysis identifies a appropriate theme, budget and content availability on that selected theme. Additional criteria copyright issues also are considered in this phase.

2. Project design

Once the theme is finalized objectives, goals, and activities are drawn for the multimedia project. General statements are termed as goals. The specific statements in the project is known as the objectives. Activities are series of actions performed to implement an objective. These activities contribute to the Project design phase.

3. Pre-production

Based on the planning and design, it is necessary to develop the project. The following are the steps involved in pre-production:

4. Budgeting

Budgeting for each phases like consultants, hardware, software, travel, communication and publishing is estimated for all the multimedia projects.

5. Multimedia Production Team

The production team for a highend multimedia project requires a team efforts. The team comprises of members playing various roles and responsibilities like Script writer, Production manager, Editor, Graphics Architect, Multimedia Architect and Web Master.

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6. Hardware/Software Selection

All multimedia Application requires appropriate tools to develop and playback the application. Hardware includes the selection of fastest CPU, RAM and huge monitors, sufficient disc for storing the records. Selection of the suitable software and file formats depends on the funds available for the project being developed.

7. Defining the Content

Content is the "stuff" provided by content specialist to the multimedia architect with which the application is developed, who prepares the narration, bullets, charts and tables etc.

8. Preparing the structure

A detailed structure must have information about all the steps along with the timeline of the future action. This structure defines the activities, responsible person for each activity and the start/end time for each activity.

9. Production

In the multimedia application, after the pre-production activities, the production phase starts. This phase includes the activities like background music selection, sound recording and so on. Text is incorporated using OCR software, Pictures shot by digital camera, Video clips are shot, edited and compressed. A pilot project is ready by this time.

10. Testing

The complete testing of the pilot product is done before the mass production to ensure that everything is in place, thereby avoiding the failure after launch. If it's an web based product,




Figure 4.12 Steps in Multimedia Production









its functioning is tested with different browsers like Internet Explorer, Mozilla Netscape Chrome, and Navigator. If it is a local multimedia application on a LAN it must be deployed in the server for testing purpose. After the testing process are over, the product is incorporated with valid suggested changes.

11. Documentation

User documentation is a mandatory feature of all multimedia projects. The documentation has all the valuable information's starting from the system requirement till the completion of testing. Contact details, e-mail address and phone numbers are provided for technical support and sending suggestions and comments.

12. Delivering the Multimedia Product

Multimedia applications best delivered on CD/DVD or in the website. In reality various challenges are faced while delivering through internet, like bandwidth problems, huge number of plugins required to play audio and video and long downloading time. Finally, a multimedia application is delivered in a more effective way by the integration of two mediums CD-ROM/DVD and Internet.

4.5.2 Multimedia Production

Managing team members in a way to get maximum outcome with high degree of efficiency is mandatory in multimedia production. The fine quality high-end

multimedia production application requires a specialize team comprises of the following members:

1. Production Manager

In a multimedia production, the role of production manager is to define, and coordinate, the production of the multimedia project in time and with full quality. The production manager should be an expertise in the technology expert, good at proposal writing, good communication skills and budget management skills. Also must have experience in human resource management and act as an efficient team leader.

2. Content Specialist

Content specialist is responsible performing for all research activities concerned with the proposed application's Program content refers to projects information, graphics, data or facts presented through the multimedia production.

3. Script Writer

Video and film scripts represents a linear sequence of events. The script writer visualizes the concepts in three dimensional environments and if needed uses the virtual reality integration into the program.

4. Text Editor

The content of a multimedia always production must logically and the text always be structured and correct grammatically. Text and narration is an integrated part of the application.








Figure 4.13 Multimedia Production Team

5. Multimedia Architect

The multimedia architect integrates all the multimedia building blocks like graphics, text, audio, music, video, photos and animation by using an authoring software.

6. Computer Graphic Artist

The role of Computer Graphic Artist is to deal with the graphic elements of the programs like backgrounds, bullets, buttons, pictures editing, 3-D objects, animation, and logos etc.

7. Audio and Video Specialist

The roles of these specialists are needed for dealing with narration and digitized videos to be added in a multimedia presentation. They are responsible for recording, editing sound effects and digitizing.

8. Computer Programmer

The computer programmer writes the lines of code or scripts in the appropriate language. These scripts usually develops special functions like developing the software to give the size and shape of video windows, controlling peripherals and so on.

9. Web Master

The responsibility of the web master is to create and maintain an Internet web page. They converts a multimedia presentation into a web page. Final multimedia product is ready for consultation is a joint effort of the entire team. Initially, the production manager identifies the project content, while the web master provides access to a wide range of community through web-services.

4.6 Multimedia on Internet

Major applications have been developed with the integration of internet and multimedia like maps, media rich blogs etc. A comprehensive study on use of internet and multimedia in USA says that an estimated 55 million consumers use Internet radio and video services each month. Image is the most widely used multimedia resource on internet. Social networking sites like Facebook (www. facebook.com) also enables multimedia rich contents to be exchanged online.

Applications of Multimedia

Multimedia is the most fast growing area in the field of information technology. A Multimedia is an application which has in its use collection of multiple media sources like text, images, sound/audio, animation and video on a single platform. Predominantly, Entertainment Education are the fields where multimedia is used in majority.

1. Education

Multimedia plays an vital role in offering an excellent alternative method to traditional teaching by allowing the students to explore and learn various concepts through animation. Students, teachers and the parents enjoy this multimedia mode of learning and multimedia learning materials. Many educators accepts multimedia introduces new ways of thinking in the classroom. Multimedia based teaching and learning system named as MODULO at GMU in Germany developed is a web-based environment that aims to provide students with flexible and decentralized learning environment based their educational background.

In India, multimedia is used in different ways for teaching and learning like e-learning, distance learning, virtual learning and so on. EDUSAT (Education Satellite) is launched in India for serving the educational sector of the country for emulating virtual classroom in an effective manner.

2. Entertainment

The remarkable advancement in the entertainment industry is due to the Multimedia Technology mainly. This technology is needed in all mode of entertainment like radio, TV, online gaming, video on demand etc.

Video on demand or movies on demand is a service that provides movies to television sets on an individual basis at homes. Movies are stored in a central server and transmitted through communication network.

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set-top box connected to the communication network converts the digital information to analog signals and inputs it to the television set.

3. Business Systems

applications Business for multimedia include presentations, training, internet protocols and so on. The marketing and advertising agencies are using animation techniques for sales promotion. Multimedia is used very commonly for building employee ID. High resolution projectors are common for multimedia presentations on the road. Cell phones and personal digital assistants with Bluetooth and Wi-Fi communication technology makes multimedia communication for business more efficiently.

4. Medical Services

Medical services are grown drastically with the development of multimedia. Medical Students practices surgery methods via simulation prior to actual surgery. Tiny digital cameras are inserted in human body and it displays the inner scene of the body. In this way the medical practitioners were able to see the inner part without dissecting it.

5. Public Places

Multimedia is available in many public places like trade shows, libraries, railway stations, museums, malls, airports, banks, hotels and exhibitions in the form of kiosks. It provides information to the customers and helps them. The information presented in kiosk are

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enriched with animation, video, still pictures, graphics, diagrams, maps, audio and text. Banks uses kiosks in the form of ATM machines.

6. Multimedia Conferencing

Multimedia conferencing or videoconferencing is a system that performs face-to-face interactions among participating users, located far from each other, as if they were sitting and discussing in a single room.

4.8 Libraries, Information Centers and Archives

The primary function of library is to organize, collect, preserve, and disseminate information to users. Several techniques and technologies are in use for handling the information more effectively. Multimedia technology is adopted by the libraries in various functions like multimedia kiosks, user orientation programs etc. Following is the brief account of multimedia technology applications in libraries.

1. Multimedia Kiosk

Kiosk is a free-standing furnished equipped multimedia computer that allow users to retrieve information via a touch screen. It is commonly used in airports and other public locations to provide directions and few mandatory information's. In an library, Kiosk is usually located near the entrance of the library, used for displaying announcements, reading lists, comments and suggestions from library users and other information's about operations and programs of the library.





2. Webcasting and Video Conferencing

The live telecast of real time programs through internet known is Webcasting. Video conferencing is the process of conducting conference between more than two participants at different sites by using computer networks to transmit audio and video data.

3. User Orientation Program

The role of multimedia plays an vital role in training the librarians in schools, colleges and universities due to its interactivity. Hence, it is used in depth subject training to their faculties.

4. In-house Production of Multimedia Resources and E-publishing

Many libraries produce multimedia resources in-house, to serve the parent organization. Introduction of CD/DVD and their writers has solved few of the problems of libraries in storing or achieving the materials. Multimedia tools along with CD-writers is made possible to publish information from different sources in a most easy to use and acceptable form to library users.

5. Digital Multimedia Libraries

Information's are available digital formats that include digital books, scanned images, graphics and digitized audio-visual clips etc. Initially digital library projects were based only on textual data, later it was on all other media elements like images, audio and video recordings were also integrated under the collection of digital library.




Fig. 5.2 Starting Flash Window

5.5 Creating a new document

Before you can draw or animate in Flash, you need to create a new document. You can create a new document from the **Welcome Screen** or from the **File menu** at the top of the screen.

1. The Welcome Screen of the Flash is the launch pad for creating and opening files. It appears when Flash is first launched or when no documents are open in the application.

From the Create New column in the middle of the Welcome Screen, click on ActionScript 3.0.




Figure 5.3 Creating a New Document







2. From the File menu, choose File > New to create a new document.








Fig. 5.5 New Document Dialog box

Now, your workspace appears as shown in following figure.




Fig. 5.6 Essentials Workspace

5.6 The Flash workspace

The Flash CS6 workspace includes a variety of tools and other components that you work with to create Flash applications.

5.6.1 Flash Window Components

The Flash window is divided into four main components. They are

- 1. Stage and Pasteboard
- 2. Timeline

- **3.** Tools panel
- 4. Property Inspector




Fig. 5.7 Flash Window Components

5.6.2 The Stage and Pasteboard (work area)

The white rectangle area in the middle of your workspace is called the **Stage**.

All the animations, objects and scenes for a Flash movie are created, edited, placed and played back in the stage.

As with a theater stage, the Flash Stage is the area that viewers see when a movie is playing. The term movie refers to Flash-created movies.

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It contains the text, images, audio and video that appear on the screen. You can resize the Stage. By default, the Flash Stage appears white, but, you can change its background color from the Document settings dialog box using the Modify > Document (Ctrl +J) command. To change the view of the Stage, Zoom in and out. To help in positing the items on the Stage, you can use the grid, guides and rulers.

The gray area surrounding the Stage in Flash is the **Pasteboard**. You can create





and edit objects in the pasteboard also but they will not be visible in the final movie. Only the graphical objects kept inside the stage are visible in the final movie.

The Stage reflects the actual size of the movie you create in Flash when it is published.

5.6.3 The Timeline

The timeline is one of the most important components of Flash. It is located below the Stage. It is used to specify of each element's appearance and animation.

The Timeline also contains Frames and Layers. Flash movies measure time in frames. Frames are the discrete, small slices of time. You can change the content on the Flash Stage for different frames.

A red vertical line in the Timeline is called the Playhead. When the movie plays, the playhead moves through the frames in the Timeline.

To display a frame's content on the Stage, you should move the playhead to that frame in the Timeline.

Layers help you organize the artwork in your movie. Each layer can contain a different image that appears on the Flash Stage. You can draw and edit objects on one layer without affecting objects on another layer of Timeline. You can hide, lock, or show the contents of layers by clicking the dots in the layer under the layer option icons.

Timeline is the record of every frame, layer and scene that makes up a movie. It controls and organizes the movie's content over time using layers and frames.




Fig. 5.8 Timeline









5.6.4 The Flash Tools panel

The Flash Tools panel includes the tools you need to create, select, or edit graphics on the Stage. The double arrows at the top of the Tools panel are used to collapse the panel to icononly view, or to expand the panel and see all the tools. By default, the toolbar is on the right side of your screen. The single capital letter in parentheses indicate the keyboard shortcuts to select those tools.




Fig. 5.9 Tools Panel









Using the Tools Panel

The Tools panel contains a collection of tools. When you move the mouse pointer on a tool, its name appears.

Some tools in the Tools panel have additional options that allow you to modify their use. For example, the Brush tool has options for changing the size and shape of the brush head. When the tool is selected, the options are available in the Options area of the Tools panel.

Selection Tool (V)

This tool is used to select an object or parts of an object, such as the stroke or fill, and to reshape and reposition objects. The options for the Selection tool are Snap to Objects (aligns objects), Smooth (smooths lines), and Straighten (straightens lines).

Subselection Tool (A)

This tool is used to select, drag, and reshape an object. We know that vector graphics are composed of lines and curves (each of which is a segment) connected by anchor points. When you select an object with this tool, it displays the anchor points and allows you to use them to edit the object.

Free Transform Tool (Q)

It is used to rotate, scale, skew, and distort objects.

Gradient Transform Tool (F)

It is used to transform a gradient fill by adjusting the size, direction, or center of the fill. The Free and Gradient Transform tools are grouped within one icon on the Tools panel. To see the menu containing grouped tools, click and hold the tool icon until the menu opens.

3D Rotation Tool (W)

It is used to create 3D effects by rotating movie clips in 3D space on the Stage.

3D Translation Tool (G)

It is used to create 3D effects by moving movie clips in 3D space on the Stage. The 3D Rotation and the 3D Translation tools are grouped within one icon on the Tools panel.

Lasso Tool (L)

It is used to select objects or parts of objects by drawing a freehand.

Pen Tool (P)

It is used to draw lines and curves by creating a series of dots, known as anchor points, that are automatically connected. Other tools used to add, delete, and convert the anchor points created by the Pen tool are grouped with the Pen tool.

Text Tool (T)

It is used to create and edit text.

Line Tool (N)

It is used to draw straight lines. You can draw vertical, horizontal, and 45° diagonal lines by pressing and holding Shift key while drawing the line.

Rectangle Tool(R)

It is used to draw rectangular shapes. Press and hold Shift key to draw a perfect square.

Oval Tool (O)

It is used to draw oval shapes. Press and hold Shift key to draw a perfect circle.

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Primitive Rectangle and Oval (R)

It is used to draw objects with properties, such as corner radius or inner radius, that can be changed using the Properties panel.

PolyStar Tool

It is used to draw polygons and stars. The Rectangle, Oval, Primitive, and PolyStar tools are grouped within one tool on the Tools panel.

Pencil Tool (Y)

It is used to draw freehand lines and shapes. The Pencil Mode option displays a menu with the following commands:

Straighten (draws straight lines), Smooth (draws smooth curved lines), and Ink (draws freehand with no modification).

Brush Tool (B)

It is used to draw (paint) with brush-like strokes.

Spray Brush Tool

It is used to spray colors and patterns onto objects. Dots are the default pattern for the spray. However, you can use a graphic symbol, such as a flag, to create a pattern.

The Brush and Spray Brush tools are grouped together.

Deco Tool (U)

It is used to turn graphic shapes into geometric patterns or to create kaleidoscopic like effects.

Bone Tool (M)

It is used to animate objects that have joints. For example you could use a series of linked objects, such as arms and legs to create character animations.

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Bind Tool

It is used to adjust the relationships among individual bones. The Bone and Bind tools are grouped together.

Paint Bucket Tool (K)

It is used to fill enclosed areas of a drawing with color.

Ink Bottle Tool (S)

It is used to apply line colors and thickness to the stroke of an object. The Paint Bucket and Ink Bottle are grouped together.

Eyedropper Tool (I)

It is used to select stroke, fill, and text attributes so they can be copied from one object to another.

Eraser Tool (E)

It is used to erase lines and fills.

Hand Tool (H)

It is used to move the Stage around the Pasteboard by dragging the Stage.

Zoom Tool (Z)

It is used to change the magnification of an area of the Stage. Clicking an area of the Stage zooms in and holding down Alt Key and clicking zooms out.

Stroke Color Tool

It is used to set the stroke color of drawn objects.

Fill Color Tool

It is used to set the fill color of drawn objects.

Black and White Tool

It is used to set the stroke color to black and the fill color to white.

Swap Colors Tool

It is used to swap the stroke and fill colors.

5.6.5 Property Inspector

The Property Inspector appears on the right side of your Flash workspace by default. It is grouped with the Library panel. It displays properties and options for objects selected on the Stage, and also allows you to modify them. The object can be text, an image, a line, or any other shape.




Figure 5.10 Property Inspector and Library panels

5.7 Flash applications

With Flash, you can integrate text, images, video, and sound to your projects, and create animations and application interfaces. Any content you generate with Flash is called an application.

Documents, Movies, and **Applications**

KNUMS When you work in Flash, you are creating a document. As you save your work as an .fla file, you are saving the document. This is consistent with other Adobe products, such as Photoshop, that use the word document to refer to work created in that program. In addition, because Flash uses a movie metaphor with a Stage, Timeline, frames, animations, and so on, the work done in Flash is often referred to as a movie. So, the phrase Flash document and the phrase Flash movie are synonymous.

Movies can be as small and simple as a ball bouncing across the screen or as complex as a full-length interactive adventure game.

Products such as games, educational software, online advertisements product demonstrations are referred to as applications. An Application usually contains multiple Flash documents or movies that are linked.

5.8 **Drawing in Flash**

Adobe Flash Professional CS6 has many powerful tools to help you create vectorbased shapes, paths, colors and patterns. Although Flash can work with pixel or bitmap images, the drawing tools in Flash create vector-based artwork.

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5.8.1 Line tool

This tool is used to create straight lines on the stage.

To use the Line tool, follow these steps.

- 1. Click the Line Tool(N) on the tools panel.
- **2.** From the Property Inspector panel, select the desired stroke colour, thickness and style for the line.
- **3.** Bring the mouse pointer onto the stage.
- **4.** Click on the stage and then drag to draw a line.




Figure 5.12 A Line

5.8.2 Oval Tool

This tool is used to draw ovals and circles. To use the Oval tool, follow the steps.

- **1.** Click the Oval Tool(O) on the tools panel.
- 2. From the Property Inspector panel, select the desired stroke colour, thickness, style and fill colour of the oval.
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- 3. Position the mouse pointer on the stage where you want the oval. The mouse pointer changes to a plus sign(+). Keeping the mouse button pressed, drag the mouse to draw the oval.
- **4.** Release the mouse button when you get an oval of the desired size.

You can also draw a circle using the Oval Tool by just pressing and holding the **Shift** key while dragging the mouse.












Figure 5.13 Oval Tool in the Tools Panel




Figure 5.14 An Oval and A Circle

5.8.3 Rectangle Tool

This tool is used for drawing rectangles and squares.

To use the Rectangle Tool, follow these steps.

- 1. Click the Rectangle Tool(R) on the Tools panel.
- 2. From the Property Inspector panel, select the required settings for the rectangle.
- 3. Bring the mouse pointer onto the stage. Keeping the mouse button pressed, drag the mouse to draw the rectangle.
- 4. Release the mouse button when you get the rectangle of the desired size.

You can also draw a square using the Rectangle Tool by just pressing and holding the Shift key while dragging the mouse.




Figure 5.15 A Rectangle and a Square





The Rectangle Tool can also be used to draw a rectangle with rounded corners. To draw a rectangle with rounded corners, follow these steps.

- 1. Click the Rectangle Tool(R) on the Tools panel.
- 2. Click Rectangle Corner Radius modifier in the Rectangle Options area.
- 3. Enter the value for Rectangle Corner radius between 0 and 999 and then click OK.
- 4. Bring the mouse pointer onto the stage. Keeping the mouse button pressed, drag the mouse to draw the rounded corner rectangle.
- 5. Release the mouse button when you get the desired rectangle with rounded corners.




Figure 5.16 Rectangle with rounded corners

5.8.4 **PolyStar Tool**

This tool is used for drawing polygons and stars and hence, named PolyStar. The number of sides in a polygon or number of points in a star varies from 3 to 32. To use the PolyStar Tool, follow these steps.

- 1. Click the drop-down arrow in the Rectangle Tool button and then click PolyStar Tool from the submenu that appears.
- 2. From the Property Inspector panel, select the required settings of the shape.

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- 3. Click the Options button in the Property Inspector panel. The Tool Settings dialog box appears.
 - a) Click polygon or star from Style drop-down list box.
 - b) Enter the value between 3 and 32 to specify the number of sides of a polygon or points of a star.
 - c) If star option is selected from the Style list box, then specify a value
- between 0 and 1 in the Star point size text box. The value 0 means that star will be created with maximum depth and value 1 means that star will be created with minimum depth.
- d) Click OK button.
- 4. Click on the stage and then drag to draw the desired shape.




Figure 5.17 PolyStar Tool in the Tools panel




Figure 5.18 Polygon

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


Figure 5.19 Star

5.9 Eraser Tool

This tool is used for removing or erasing areas or objects just like a normal eraser. When the Eraser Tool is selected, Eraser Mode modifier, Faucet modifier and Eraser Shape modifier icons appear in the Options area.

Eraser Mode modifier helps the user to select the required erasing mode. This icon includes five options which are as follows:

Erase Normal: This mode erases everything which is present on the stage.

Erase Fills : This mode erases only fills with lines remain unaffected.

Erase Lines : This mode erases only lines but the fills remain unaffected.

Erase Selected Fills: This mode erases only selected fills with lines and unselected fills remain unaffected.

Erase Inside: This mode erases only the fill on which you begin the eraser stroke with lines remain unaffected. If you start erasing from an empty point, nothing is erased.

Faucet modifier erases lines and fills in just one click, that is, you do not have to drag the eraser on the stage for removing objects. The Eraser Shape modifier helps

you to choose a particular shape and size of the eraser.

The Eraser Tool can be used in various ways as discussed below.

To quickly erase everything present on the stage, just double-click the Eraser Tool on the toolbox.




Figure 5.20 Eraser Tool in Tools Panel




Figure 5.21 Eraser Mode modifier

To erase filled areas or lines, follow these steps.

- a) Click the Eraser Tool on the Tools panel.
- b) Click Faucet modifier form the Options area.
- c) Click the desired filled area or line which needs to be removed.

To erase by dragging, follow these steps.

- a) Click the Eraser Tool on the Tools panel.
- b) Click on the desired option from the Eraser Mode modifier and Eraser Shape modifier. A user must make sure that the Faucet modifier should not be selected.
- c) Click and drag the mouse pointer on the area which needs to be removed.

This tool is used for inserting text on the stage. To use the Text Tool, follow these steps.

- 1. Click the Text Tool on the Tool Panel.
- 2. From the Property Inspector panel, select the desired font, font size, text colour, style, letter spacing, and alignment option for the text to be written in the text box.
- 3. For typing the text, perform any of these steps.

Click on the stage and start typing. This makes the text box to expand in accordance of the text written.

Draw a rectangular area by dragging the mouse pointer on the stage. This creates a fixed-size text box. Now, type the text in this text box. The text will automatically wrap according to the width of the text box.




Figure 5.23 Using the Text Tool typing the text

5.11 **Selecting Objects**

Before you can edit any object on the Flash Stage, you need to select it. Flash offers many ways to select objects.

Selecting with the 5.11.1 **Selection tool**

To select an object, click the Selection tool (the dark-colored arrow in the Tools panel) and click the object.

If the object doesn't have an outline and is just a fill, click the object with the Selection tool, and it's selected.

If the object has an outline and a fill, click on the fill to select only the fill. The outline remains deselected. To select both the fill and the outline, double-click on the fill.





Figure 5.25 Object with outline

To select the entire object, you can use the Selection tool to create a selection box. Click at one corner and drag to an opposite corner, making sure that the bounding box completely encloses the object or objects that you want to select.



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To select just an outline, click the outline with the Selection tool.




Figure 5.28 Selecting just an outline

If the outline is made up of several objects, double-click it to select the entire outline.



To select several unconnected objects, select one object, then press and hold the Shift key, and select additional objects. When you press Shift key, you can add to already selected objects and select as many objects as you want.

To deselect all selected objects, click any blank area. If you selected several objects and want to deselect one object, press Shift and click that object.

5.11.2 Selecting with Lasso tool

(1) Freehand selection

The Lasso tool is used for selecting objects by drawing a freehand selection area. To use the Lasso Tool follow these steps.

- 1. Click the Lass Tool on the Tools panel.
- 2. To lasso freehand, make sure that the Polygon Mode modifier (in the Options section of the Tools panel) is not selected.
- 3. Click anywhere on the Stage and drag around the objects that you want to select. Flash creates a selection area while you drag. Release the mouse button close to where you started it to close the lasso's loop.




Figure 5.30 Freehand selection

(2) Point-to-point selection

The Lasso Tool can also be used to create point-to-point selection of objects. To create such selection, follow these steps.

- 1. Click the Lasso Tool on the toolbox.
- 2. Click the Polygon Mode modifier from the Options area.
- 3. Click on the stage at a point from where you want to start the selection.

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- 4. Continue click on the stage to form the outline around the objects that are to be selected.
- **5.** Double-click to close the selection.




Figure 5.31 Point-to-point Selection

5.12 Zoom Tool

This tool is used to zoom in (enlarge) and zoom out (reduce) the display size of any area of the stage. Thus, zoom Tool changes the magnification level of the object. Click on the Enlarge or Reduce modifiers present in the Options area to zoom in or zoom out the object respectively.




Figure 5.32 Zoom Tool in the Tools Panel

5.13 Hand Tool

When the stage is magnified, you may not be able to view the entire stage at once. The Hand Tool allows you to move the stage so that you can view the objects without changing the magnification level. It allows you to have a closer look at a particular portion of the object on the stage.

To use Hand Tool, follow these steps.

- 1. Click the Hand Tool on the Tools panel.
- 2. Click and drag the stage to the desired location. Note that the Hand Tool only moves stage and not the objects.
- **3.** Release the mouse button.

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5.14 **Creating Flash Animation**

Frame -by-Frame Animation

Follow the steps to create a frame-by-frame animation sample:

1. Select the Text Tool and type the text or slogan, for example 'Save Trees – Save Earth'.




Figure 5.33 Using the text tool typing the text

2. Select the text and convert it to a symbol by choosing Modify > Convert to Symbol (or) pressing F8 function key. The Convert to Symbol dialog box appears. Type the name for the symbol, for example Save Trees and press OK button. The text is saved as a symbol.




Figure 5.34 Convert to symbol option in the Modify Menu

- 3. The new symbol appears in the Library panel. If the Library panel is not open, select Window > Library.

5. Select **Insert** > **Timeline** > **Frame**.




Figure 5.37 Frames inserted in the Timeline

6. With Frame 15 still selected, select **Insert > Timeline > Keyframe**. A keyframe is added in Frame 15. A keyframe is a frame where some property of an object is explicitly changed. In this new keyframe, you will change the the colour of the text symbol by selecting the colour drop-down list in the Color tab.

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7. Similarly, add four or five more keyframes and changes the colour of text in each keyframe.




Figure 5.39 Inserting a keyframe in Frame 30, 45

8. Place the playhead on the Frame1 and select Control > Test Movie > in Flash Professional to play the movie or animation.




Figure 5.40 Choosing Test Movie






Figure 5.41 The Test Movie Window



AutoCAD software is used by architects, CAD technicians, designers, engineers, project managers, and CAD/ It managers in a variety of industries, including the manufacturing, building, civil, and mapping industries.








Fig. 6.2 AutoCAD 2016 -English icon on the Desktop

6.4 AUTOCAD 2016 INTERFACE

The AutoCAD 2016 interface is based on Ribbons and the Application Menu. The important feature of this interface is that the size of the Graphical Area will be bigger.




Fig. 6.5 AutoCAD 2016 screen components in AutoCAD Drafting & Annotation workspace

6.4.1 Application Menu

The Application menu appears when you click the red "A" called the Application Button. This menu contains file-related commands such as creating a new file, opening an existing file, saving the current file, saving the current file under a new name and in a different folder, exporting the current file to a different file format, printing and publishing the current file, etc.




Fig. 6.6 Application Button

The Search bar displays at the top of the Application menu. It is used to search for any command. If you type any keyword in the search bar, you can find a list of commands related to it.




Fig. 6.8 Search Bar in the Application Menu






6.4.2 Title bar

The title bar contains the program name (Autodesk AutoCAD 2016) and the title of the current drawing (Drawing1.dwg).




Fig. 6.11 Title Bar

6.4.3 Quick Access Toolbar

This toolbar is located at the top left corner of the window next to the red 'A' button. It contains all File commands mentioned in the Application Menu along with Workspace and Undo/Redo.

You can add or remove commands by using Customize Quick Access Toolbar. You can also add Menu bar by clicking Show Menu Bar.

6.4.4 Ribbon

On the top of the AutoCAD 2016 window, just below the title bar, is a wide area called the Ribbon. The Ribbon consists of two parts: tabs and panels, as shown below:




Fig. 6.13 Customize Quick Access Toolbar

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In the Home tab of the Ribbon, Draw, Modify, Annotation, Layers, etc. panels are displayed.

Some panels such as Draw, Modify have more buttons than shown. These panels can be expanded to display more tools. You can see an arrow to the right of a

panel title. When you click on the arrow, it expands the panel to display additional tools and controls. By default, an expanded panel closes automatically when you click or move to another panel. To keep a panel expanded, click the push icon in the bottom-left corner of the expanded panel.

For some commands, there are many options. AutoCAD put all the options in the same button as shown in Fig. You can easily access these options.




Fig. 6.16. Buttons with more options

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The ribbons have a very simple help feature. If you hover the mouse over a button, a small help screen will appear.




Fig. 6.17. A Small help Screen appears

If you leave the mouse over the button for a longer period of time, AutoCAD will show more detailed help screen.




Fig. 6.18. More Detailed Help Screen





- Panels have two states—either docked or floating. By default all panels in the Ribbon are docked in their respective tab. Drag and drop the panel in the drawing area to make it floating.
- You can send the panel back to its respective tab by clicking the small button at the top right side.



Changing the display of the Ribbon

You can change the display of the ribbon by clicking the Minimize Ribbon button located at the top of it. The ribbon can be displayed in three different modes as shown below.

1. When you click the Minimize Ribbon button for the first time, the full ribbon changes to display tabs and panel buttons. Now hover the cursor over the panel buttons. The panel buttons expand to reveal all the tools shown on the full ribbon.

2. When you click the Minimize Ribbon button for the second time, the panel buttons change into panel titles. Now hover the cursor again over the panel titles to reveal each panel's tools.

3. When you click the Minimize Ribbon button for the third time, the panel titles change into panel tabs. Hovering the cursor over the panel tabs doesn't have any effect. Click the Home tab in the ribbon to reveal the full panel temporarily. It disappears after you move the cursor away.




Fig. 6.26. Minimize Ribbon Button's Menu

6.4.5 Start Tab

When you click the Start tab at any moment, you will get the AutoCAD 2016 Initial screen again. Using it, you can start a new drawing, open an existing drawing, etc.

6.4.6 File tabs

File tabs are located beneath the ribbon. For each opened file a tab is created. You can easily switch between different drawing files by using the file tabs.

You can also create a new drawing file by clicking on the (+) sign available at the end of the file tabs.







The File tab bar is located at the bottom of the Ribbon. In the bar, all the tabs added get arranged in the sequence in which the respective drawings are created. Using mouse you can change the sequence of tabs in the File tab bar. To do so, press and hold the left mouse button on any tab and drag it to the desired location on the tab bar.

All File tabs are gray in colour. The current file (tab) will appear in a lighter gray, and the other tabs will appear in a darker gray.

If you hover over one of the file tabs, two things will take place:

- The path of this file will appear above the File tab.
- The model space and the layouts of this file will appear beneath the tab.

A star beside the name of the file in the file tab means this file has changed and you need to save changes.

- You can also close the File tab by clicking on the (x) sign beside the name.
- The user can customize the File tabs by switching them off. To do so, press the View tab in the ribbon and locate the Interface panel. Click on the Files tab button to close the File tab bar.

6.4.7 Drawing Area

The drawing area covers the major portion of the screen. You can easily draw objects and create 3D graphics in this area.

6.4.8 Command Window

The command window is normally located at the bottom of the application window, just above the status bar. This window normally contains three lines of text and the first two lines list the immediate command history. The bottom line is the command line. If you do not see the command window, press Ctrl + 9 to make it appear.

You can enter a command manually at the command line. You can type at the cursor position on the command line, that is, the Command: prompt.

If you just type the first letter of a command, it will list all the commands starting with that letter. Note: Always press ENTER after you type values on the command line.

You can drag this window to a different place on the screen and resize it.

When you enter a command, AutoCAD doesn't care if you use UPPERCASE or lowercase characters, or a combination of either. If you make a mistake typing on the command line, press the BACKSPACE key to correct.

You can press ESC at any time. If you press ESC while an operation is in progress, it terminates the command.

To repeat the command you previously entered in AutoCAD, press ENTER (or the spacebar) at the 'Command:' prompt. As an alternative, right-click to display the cursor menu, and then select the Repeat option.

Recent Input

AutoCAD remembers the last twenty commands and options you enter at the 'Command:' prompt, or select from a menu or toolbar. Autodesk calls this "Recent Input."

If you prefer to see a list of the command history, right-click, and then select Recent Input from the shortcut menu. AutoCAD lists the previous commands and/or coordinate inputs in a submenu.

6.4.9 UCS Icon

You can see an L-shaped line in the lowerleft corner of the drawing area. It is called the UCS icon; UCS is short for "User Coordinate System."

- The UCS icon is useful primarily for drawing in three dimensions.
- The icon is not needed for 2D drafting, and you can turn it off with the UCSICON command. Type the command name, and then enter the Off option, as follows:
- Command: ucsicon (Press ENTER.)
- Enter an option [ON/OFF/All/Noorigin/ ORigin/Properties] <ON>: off (Press ENTER.)




Fig. 6.34. UCS Icon

6.4.10 **Navigation Bar**

The Navigation Bar is displayed in the drawing area and contains navigation tools.




Fig. 35. Navigation Bar

6.4.11 Status Bar

The Status Bar which is located below the command line, and docked in the lowerright corner of the window is called Application Status Bar.

It contains so many buttons which help you to create a drawing very easily. You can easily turn ON or OFF these buttons just by clicking on them.

Some buttons are hidden by default. You can also display more buttons on the status bar by clicking the Customization button at the bottom right corner and selecting the options from the menu.

Tip. When in AutoCAD 2016, the bottom status bar is not displaying, Type in STATUSBAR on the command line, and hit enter. Change the value from 0 to 1. Now the Status Bar appears on the bottom of the window.

Command: STATUSBAR →

Enter new value for STATUSBAR <0>: 1 →








Fig. 6.36. AutoCAD 2016 - Status Bar




Fig. 6.37. AutoCAD 2016 - Application

Drawing Coordinates

By default this button is hidden in AutoCAD 2016. Using the Customization menu you can show it. It displays the drawing coordinates when you move the pointer in the drawing area. You can also turn OFF this button by clicking on it.

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MODEL

The MODEL button is chosen by default because you are working in the model space to create drawings.

GRIDMODE (F7)

If the GRIDMODE button is chosen, the Display drawing grid will turn ON and the grid lines are displayed on the screen. The F7 function key can be used to turn the grid display on or off.

SNAPMODE (F9)

If the SNAPMODE button is chosen, the snap mode will turn ON. When snap is on, the cursor under mouse control can only be moved in jumps from one snap point to another. The F9 key acts as a toggle key to turn the snap off or on.

Dynamic Input (F12)

The Dynamic Input button in the status bar is used to turn the Dynamic Input on or off. If the Dynamic Input mode is turned on, the x,y coordinates and prompts show when the cursor hairs are moved. Using the F12 key, you can turn the Dynamic Input on or off.

Ortho Mode (F8)

You can turn ON or OFF the Ortho Mode just by clicking on it. If the ORTHOMODE button is chosen, you can draw lines at right angles only i.e., lines can only be drawn vertically or horizontally. You can also use the **F8** function key to turn ortho on or off.

Polar Tracking (F10)

You can turn ON or OFF the Polar Tracking just by clicking on it. When you turn ON the Polar Tracking, a small tip appears showing the direction and length of lines etc. in degrees and units. You can draw lines easily at regular angular increments, such as 5, 10, 15, 23, 30, 45, or 90 degrees. You can also use the F10 function key to turn on this option.

Workspace

A workspace is a complete user interface, which includes the location and appearance of the drawing area and all menus, buttons, and groupings of buttons. Think of a workspace as a unique, specific arrangement of AutoCAD's features and capabilities that can be retrieved at any time. It is easy to switch between workspaces, modify workspaces, and create custom workspaces to match the specific requirements of a user or a particular task.

Workspace Switching

In AutoCAD 2016, you can switch between different workspaces by using the Workspace Switching button that is available at the right of the Status Bar. On clicking the Workspace Switching button, a flyout will be displayed with the list of all available workspace. You can select the required workspace to invoke.




Fig. 6.38. Workspace Switching button





There are three workspaces available in AutoCAD 2016: **Drafting & Annotation, 3D Basics, and 3D Modeling**. By default, the Drafting & Annotation workspace is activated in AutoCAD 2016. You can easily create 2D drawings in this workspace.




Fig. 6.40. Three Types of Workspaces




Fig. 6.41. Down Arrow Next To Quick Access Toolbar




Fig. 6.42. Workspace Drop-down List Box







Clean Screen

The Clean Screen button hides most interface elements such as the Ribbon, and maximizes the drawing area to focus on the current drawing. This button is at the lower right corner of the screen. Choose the Clean Screen button again to restore the previous display state of the screen.




Fig. 6.43. Clean screen

Customization




Fig. 6.44. Customization menu




Fig. 6.45. Show Menu Bar Option




Fig. 6.46. Menu Bar

6.6 Working in the Command-Line Interface

The command-line interface is docked by default along the bottom edge of the drawing area. It serves as your primary method of interacting with AutoCAD. You use this interface to tell the software what you would like it to do for you. The AutoCAD software uses this interface to communicate the information it needs from you.




Fig. 6.50. The New button in the Quick Access toolbar




Fig. 6.51. Select Template Dialog Box




Fig. 6.52. The Line tool in the Draw panel




Fig. 6.53. The Command Line




Fig. 6.54. Drawing lines using the Line tool

Note

When you specify the start point of the line by pressing the left mouse button, a rubber band line stretches between the selected point and the current position of the cursor.

Note that in the Command prompt the Close and Undo options will be displayed while creating lines using the Line tool.

The Undo Option

While drawing a line, if you specify a wrong endpoint, then you can undo the last specified point and go back to the previous stage by using the Undo option of the Line tool. You can use this option multiple times. To use this option, type Undo (or just U) at the Specify next point or [Undo] prompt. You can also right-click to display the shortcut menu and then choose the Undo option from it.

The Close Option

After drawing two continuous lines by using the Line tool, you will notice that the Close option is displayed at the Command prompt. (This option does not appear until you have picked three points, because a







minimum of two line segments are needed before a polygon can be created by the third closing segment.)

The Close option is used to join the current point to the start point of the first line when two or more continuous lines are drawn. If you specify the endpoint by using the mouse, then click at the start point of the first line or enter C at the Command prompt, as given in the Command prompt below.

Command: LINE

Specify first point: Pick the first point.

Specify next point or [Undo]: Pick the second point.

Specify next point or [Undo]: Pick the third point.

Specify next point or [Close/Undo]: C (The fourth point joins with the first point).





Fig. 6.55 Drawing lines using Close option


The drawing seen on the screen is a triangle of arbitrary size. To prepare the correct dimensional engineering drawings, the Coordinate systems is used.

6.7.2 COORDINATE SYSTEMS

In AutoCAD, the location of a point is specified in terms of Cartesian coordinates. In this system, each point in a plane is specified by a pair of numerical coordinates. To specify a point in a plane, take two mutually perpendicular lines as references. The horizontal line is called the X axis, and the vertical line is called the Y axis. The X and Y axes divide the XY plane into four parts, generally known as quadrants. The point of intersection of these two axes is called the origin and the plane is called the XY plane.

The origin has the coordinate values of X = 0, Y = 0. The origin is taken as the reference for locating a point on the XY plane. Now, to locate a point, say P, draw a vertical line intersecting the X axis. The horizontal distance between the origin and the intersection point will be called the X coordinate of P. It will be denoted as P(x). The X coordinate specifies how far the point is to the left or right from the origin along the X axis. Now, draw a horizontal line intersecting the Y axis.




Fig. 6.56 Cartesian coordinate system

The vertical distance between the origin and the intersection point will be the Y coordinate of P. It will be denoted as P(y). The Y coordinate specifies how far the point is to the top or bottom from the origin along the Y axis. The intersection point of the horizontal and vertical lines is the coordinate of the point and is denoted as P(x,y). The X coordinate is positive, if measured from the right of the origin and is negative, if measured above the origin and is negative, if measured above the origin and is negative, if measured below the origin, refer to Figure 6.56.

In AutoCAD, the default origin is located at the lower left corner of the drawing area.

AutoCAD uses the following coordinate systems to locate a point in the XY plane.

- 1. Absolute coordinates
- 2. Relative coordinates
- 3. Polar coordinates
- 4. Direct distance entry

If you are specifying a point by entering its location at the Command prompt then you need to use any one of the coordinate systems.

Absolute Coordinate System




Fig. 6.57. Absolute Coordinate System

In the Absolute Coordinate System, points are located with respect to the origin (0,0). For example, a point with X = 4 and Y = 3 is measured 4 units horizontally (distance along the X axis) and 3 units vertically (distance along the Y axis) from the origin, as shown in Figure 6.57. In AutoCAD, the absolute coordinates are specified at the Command prompt by entering X and Y coordinates, separated by a comma.




Fig. 6.58. Drawing a figure using the absolute coordinates





Fig. 6.59. Drawing a figure using the absolute coordinates




Fig. 6.60. Drawing a figure using the absolute coordinates

Relative Coordinate System

There are two types of relative coordinates: relative rectangular and relative polar.

Relative Rectangular Coordinates (@ X distance, Y distance)




Fig. 6.61. Drawing lines using the relative rectangular coordinates

In the Relative Rectangular Coordinate system, the location of a point is specified with respect to the previous point, not with respect to the origin. To enter coordinate values in terms of the Relative Rectangular Coordinate system, check whether the Dynamic Input is on or not. If the Dynamic Input is turned on, then by default the profile will be drawn using the Relative Rectangular Coordinate system. Therefore, in this case, enter the X coordinate, type comma (,), and then enter the Y coordinate. However, if the Dynamic Input is turned off, the coordinate values have to be prefixed by the @ symbol, so that the profile will be drawn using the Relative Rectangular Coordinate system. For example, to draw a rectangle, refer to Figure 6.61 of length 4




Fig. 6.62. Drawing lines using the relative rectangular coordinates







Fig. 6.63. Drawing a square using the relative rectangular coordinates




Fig. 6.64. Drawing a figure using the relative rectangular coordinates




Fig. 6.65. Drawing a line by using Relative Polar Coordinates





Fig. 6.66. Polar Coordinates




Fig. 6.67. Drawing a Figure by using relative polar coordinates

Direct Distance Entry




Fig. 6.68 Drawing lines using the Direct Distance **Entry method**

The easiest way to draw a line in AutoCAD is by using the Direct Distance Entry method. Before drawing a line by using this method, ensure that the Dynamic Input button is chosen in the Status Bar. Next, choose the Line tool; you will be prompted to specify the start point. Enter the coordinate values in the text box and press ENTER; you will be prompted to specify the next point. Now, enter the absolute length of the line and its angle with respect to the current position of the cursor in the corresponding text boxes, as shown in Figure 6.68.

Note that you can use the TAB key to toggle between the text boxes. If the Ortho mode is on while drawing lines using this method, you can position the cursor only along the X or Y axis. If the Dynamic Input button is not chosen, then you need to enter the length of the line at the Command prompt. Therefore, position the cursor at the desired angle, type the length at the Command prompt, and then press ENTER, refer to Figure 6.68.




Fig. 6.69 The Circle Tool in the Draw Panel

A circle is drawn by using the Circle tool. In AutoCAD, you can draw a circle by using six different tools. All these tools are grouped together in the Draw panel of the Ribbon. To view these tools, choose the down arrow next to the circle tool in the Draw panel, as shown in Figure 6.69; all tools will be listed in the drop-down. Note that the name of the tool chosen last will be displayed in the Draw panel. You can also invoke the Circle tool from the Draw toolbar, or by entering C in the command prompt.




Fig. 6.70. The Circle with Centre (100, 100) and Radius 20 units




Fig. 6.71. The Circle with Centre (20, 20) and Diameter 40 units



6.7.4 **Drawing a Rectangle**

One of the most basic shapes used by drafters and designers is the rectangle. You can create a rectangle using the LINE command, but doing so has some disadvantages. For example, you would have to take the time to make sure that the corner angles are exactly 90°. Also, each line segment would be a separate object. Therefore, AutoCAD 2016 provides the RECTANG command, which allows you to create a rectangle with perfect corners and as a single object. Clicking anywhere on a rectangle created with the RECTANG command selects the entire rectangle.

To draw a Rectangle using the cursor to select the corners:

- 1. Command: RECTANGLE (or) REC (Press Enter Key)
- 2. The following will appear on the command line:

RECTANGLE

Specify first corner point or [Chamfer/Elevation/Fillet/ Thickness/Width]:

Specify the location of the first corner by moving the cursor to a location (P1) and then press the left mouse button.

3. The following will appear on the command line:

Specify other corner point or [Area / **Dimensions / Rotation**]:

Specify the location of the diagonal corner (P2) by moving the cursor diagonally away from the first corner (P1) and pressing the left mouse button.

Now a rectangle will appear.




Fig. 6.74. A Rectangle




Fig. 6.73. A Rectangle defined by diagonal points (20,30) and (150, 160)

Ribbon: **Home > Draw > Arc drop-down**(or)

Command: ARC or A

An arc is defined as a section of a circle. In AutoCAD 2016, an arc is drawn by using the tools available in the Arc drop-down list box. There are eleven different arc tools to draw an arc.

The tools to draw an arc are grouped together in the Arc drop-down of the Draw panel in the Ribbon. You can choose the appropriate tool and then draw the arc.

The tool that was used last to create an arc will be displayed in the Draw panel of the Home tab.




Fig. 6.74. Eleven Different Arc Tools




Fig. 6.75. An Arc using three points

6.8 Erasing objects

Sometimes, you may need to erase the unwanted objects from the objects drawn. You can do so by using the Erase tool. This tool is used exactly the same way as an eraser is used in manual drafting to delete the unwanted lines.

The Erase command removes objects from the drawing file.





To erase an object,

- 1. Start the ERASE command by choosing Home tab > Modify panel > Erase tool. (or) Type ERASE (or) E in the Command line.
 - Now the cursor changes from the crosshairs to a little square. This is called the pickbox. Its appearance indicates that AutoCAD is ready for you to select objects on the screen. Also note the command line; it's prompting you to select objects.
- 2. Place the pickbox on one of the objects, and click that object to be erased, and the object is faded in a light gray line weight.
- 3. Continue selecting all of the objects to be erased. The erased objects remain in a light gray line weight until the command is completed.
- **4.** Press **<Enter>** or **right-click** to erase the objects. The objects are erased, and the ERASE command ends.




Fig. 6.76. Erasing objects

Three Types of Erasing Methods

There are three methods to erase (delete) objects from the drawing.

Method 1

Select the Erase command first and then select the objects to be erased.

Press Enter Key and the objects selected will disappear.

Method 2

Select the object to be erased.

Press the **Delete** Key.




Fig. 6.77. Erasing objects - Using Delete Key




Fig. 6.78. Erasing objects - Using Shortcut Menu







Plotting (Printing) the Drawing

Printing the drawing is done with the PLOT command.

- 1. Click the big red A, and then choose **Print**.
- **2.** From the options lists, choose **Plot**. AutoCAD displays the Plot dialog box with its many options.




Fig. 6.79. Application Menu




Fig. 6.80. Plot Dialog box

- **3.** In the **Printer/plotter** area, select a printer from the Name droplist.
- **4.** In the **Plot Area** section, select Extents from the What to Plot droplist. This option ensures the entire drawing is plotted.

- 5. In the **Plot Offset** section, select Center the plot to center the drawing on the paper.
- 6. In the **Plot Scale** area, select **Fit to Paper**. This ensures the drawing fits the paper, no matter the size of paper or drawing.
- 7. At this point, the dialog box's options should look like those illustrated below.
 - To ensure the plot will work out correctly, click the **Preview** button. This lets you check for errors before committing (or wasting) paper.
- **8.** Press **ESC** to exit the print preview mode. (or) Click on the Close(X) button.
- 9. Back in the Plot dialog box, choose **OK** to start the plot.

6.10 Saving the Drawing

To save your work and remain in AutoCAD:

- **1.** Click the Save button in the Quick Access toolbar.
- 2. If the drawing has not yet been named, the **Save Drawing** As dialog box appears.
- **3.** Name the drawing in the File name text box, and then choose Save.





Fig. 6.81. Save Button in the Quick Access Toolbar










Fig. 6.82. Save Drawing As Dialog box

AutoCAD 2016 - File types

All saved drawings are called files. AutoCAD 2016 supports different file formats, including:

.dwg: AutoCAD 2016 drawing

.dws: AutoCAD 2016 Drawing Standard

.dwt: AutoCAD 2016 Template Drawing template file.

AutoCAD 2016 drawings can be saved in other formats as well as in pre-AutoCAD 2016 formats.

6.11 Closing Drawing Files

You can close the current drawing file without actually quitting AutoCAD by choosing Close>Current Drawing from the Application Menu or by entering CLOSE at the Command prompt.

To close the current opened file or all opened files,

- Click on the Application button. Now Application menu appears.
- Move the mouse to the **Close** button, then select either Current Drawing to close the current file, or All Drawings

to close all the opened files in single command.




Fig. 6.83. Close Button


